### GOING TO THE INAUGURATION

Special Train from Nebraska to Leave Friday Night.

### COLONELS TAKE THEIR WIVES

Will Stop at Historic Points Along the Way, Including the One Time Residence of Thomas Jefferson.

The Burlington's inaugural train will start for Washington at 6:30 p. m. this evening, carrying Governor Morehead, the Nebraska colonels and seventy-five to one hundred Nebraskans who are going to the national capital to be present when Woodrow Wilson is inducted into office as president of the United States next Tuesday. From Chicago the train will go over the Big Four and the Chesapeake & Ohio, reaching Washington the evening of March 2 at 6:30 o'clock.

Enroute the Nebraskans will stop at Staunton, Va., the birthplace of Wilson, and at Charlottesville, made famous as the one-time residence of Thomas Jefferson. The train will be made up of the best of the Burlington's equipment and will run from Omaha to Washington. There will be a parlor observation car, steel sleepers, diner and library cars.

### G. B. HAYNES LANDS GOOD JOB

Omaha Boy Becomes General Passenger Agent of the Milwaukee.

### HIS RISE HAS BEEN QUITE RAPID

Starts in as an Office Boy in the Omaha Office and Then Begins to Move Right Up to the Top.

Effective March 1 George B. Haynes, an Omaha boy, born and reared here, becomes general passenger agent of the entire Milwaukee system, with its 9,270 miles of road. Notice of the appointment comes from the general offices of the road, announced by President Earling of Chicago.

George B. Haynes is 42 years of age and went with the Milwaukee as an office boy in Omaha twenty years ago. From the start he had but one idea and that was to give to the company the best that was in him. He was ever imbued with this idea and as a result promoted in rapid succession. From copying telegrams and delivering messages young Haynes was put onto the street soliciting business and within a few months he was called inside and given the position of city passenger agent. Here he made good and some three years ago he was called to Chicago and appointed traveling passenger agent, with Illinois, Wisconsin, Indiana and Michigan as his territory. Some years later when the Milwaukee was extending its line to the Pacific coast, the Milwaukee was in need of an immigration agent. A number had been tried, but they failed to fill the bill. One day Haynes was called into the general offices and instructed to make a trip over the new line and make some observations. At that time the road had been constructed but a couple of hundred miles west of the Missouri river. Haynes started on the trip, going by rail to the end of the extension. From there he journeyed westward on horseback, by wagon and occasionally by automobile. The trip consumed several weeks.

Returning from the west Haynes submitted his report to President Earling,

who remarked to the then general passenger agent: "We've got the man right here in these offices who will fit into the position of general immigration agent" after he had read Haynes' report. A day or two later the appointment was made and George B. Haynes was in complete charge of the work of advertising the new west and filling it with settlers. He continued the work until one and one-half years ago, when again he was given a promotion, this time jumping to assistant general passenger agent, with headquarters in Chicago, and Illinois as his territory for short trips outside.  
As assistant general passenger agent Haynes practically had entire charge of

the general office work, outlining plans for securing business as well as assuming the executive duties that were thrust upon him.

January 15 of the present year General Passenger Agent Miller was promoted to general passenger traffic manager. This resulted in Haynes being required to assume the duties of the general passenger agent, but not the title. In this position he continued his labors until now, when he has taken over the full title of the office.

### Two Places Raided by Officers but One is Found Empty

In some mysterious manner the keeper of the St. Charles "hotel" at 149 Dodge street learned yesterday that his resort was to be raided by the police last night, and when Sergeants Vanous and Samuelson arrived with a squad of husky officers they found the place practically deserted.

The Triumph hotel at 211 South Thirteenth street, which is operated by Frank Dinuzo, was raided by the police and ten inmates were arrested. Dinuzo was not in the place at the time of the raid and Hannah Williams, a colored maid, was taken on the charge of being the keeper.

At the station all were released, while each put up a \$50 cash bond for their appearance in police court today. The Williams woman was required to put up a cash bond of \$50.

Frank Dinuzo, who operates the Triumph hotel, was sentenced in police court to serve a thirty-day jail sentence for a similar offense, but he escaped by filing notice of appeal to a higher court. In the crowd of prisoners taken from the Triumph by the police was a couple living on a farm near Hastings, who "nobody" took lodging there while here visiting the Auto show.

### WEATHER MAN MAKES GOOD ON HIS STORM PREDICTION

In corroboration of the weather man's prediction on Tuesday, the mercury took a decided drop yesterday and last night

and with it came snow, the latter being heaviest in the southeastern part of the state. In Omaha a light snow fell, but not enough to be noticed.

Reports from Beatrice are that a storm raged there all day and that a thick blanket of snow fell with it. Trains were delayed by the snow in that vicinity and it is said that yesterday's was the worst weather in Beatrice so far this season.

### TRADES RING FOR PISTOL AND FIRES IT AT FIANCE

Surprised when she saw her fiancé, whom she believed to be out of the city, enter a Broadway street motion picture theater with another girl, Beadie Gay, a pretty 19-year-old girl, living at 94 North Twenty-seventh street, traded her diamond engagement ring for a revolver at a nearby pawn shop and fired five shots at Arthur Dickman of Fremont last night at Fourteenth and Douglas streets.

None of the bullets had any effect, other than to make Dickman and his companion flee. Miss Gay was arrested by Officer Mansfield.

The identity of the other girl could not be learned last night, although detectives made a diligent search.
