APPEAL COURT DECISION

Aetna Insurance Company Files Appeal Over Court Finding. SAY RUSTIN WAS SUICIDE

Company Would Evade Payment of Insurance to Widow of Late Dr. Frederick Rustin, an Omaha Physician.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Neb., March 22.—(Special.)—The Aetna Insurance company has appealed from a judgment of the district court of Douglas county wherein Grace H. Rustin was awarded the sum of \$10,000 and interest amounting to \$2,529.56 in addition on a policy of insurance held by her husband, Dr. Frederick Rustin, who was found dead on the porch of their residence in Omaha one evening.

The case was tried several times, but each time Mrs. Rustin won her case, and the last time in the amount set forth above. The company appeals from the judgment of the court on the grounds that the evidence does not justify the verdict.

Aged Woman Nearly Frozen to Death

NORFOLK, Neb., March 22.—(Special.)—Obeying the dying request of her husband that she go to Grand Island, Neb., to take care of their dead daughter's children, Mrs. Mary Busham, aged 66, drove overland from Benson, N. D., to Grand Island and died of exposure in the blizzard. Her husband, who was in the city and almost perished in the blizzard, was found by a newspaper reporter here, huddled in her tiny prairie schooner, she admitted that she had not had a bite to eat for two days. She had been out in her little covered wagon all alone during the terrible blizzard that swept this section, and confessed that she had been bitterly cold in the night.

The overland journey made by this aged and feeble woman covered more than 400 miles. Her husband, dying, said his only regret was in departing from his wife and his last request was that she go to Grand Island to care for their motherless grandchildren.

Referee Reports in Hallowell Ouster Case Proceedings

KEARNEY, Neb., March 22.—(Special.)—Judge F. C. Harrison of Grand Island, appointed referee in the case of George Conroy against County Judge F. M. Hallowell of Buffalo county, which is an ouster proceeding in an effort to expel the judge from office, has filed his report with the county court. The case was taken up against the judge by the county attorney and the Board of Supervisors, who charged him with practicing law in his own court and unlawfully preparing papers for cases and accepting fees for such work. The report states that practically the only count on which the judge may be held is that of practicing law in his own court and that the money said to have been appropriated by him were merely mistakes in entering the same on the books and that all money had been turned over to the county.

SHERIFF EMPTIES LIQUOR FROM RAID INTO CREEK

ASHLAND, Neb., March 22.—(Special.)—Acting under an order issued by E. E. Good, judge of the district court at Wahoo, Sheriff Jerry Dailey, Jr., this afternoon publicly emptied 1,600 bottles of liquor that has been stored since the premises of the "Ashland club" were raided on September 4 last on a warrant charging Henry G. Smith, manager of the club, with unlawfully selling liquor without a license. They were dumped into Salt creek. Henry Smith, late manager of the club, pleaded guilty to the charge when arraigned before Judge Good at Wahoo and was given a fine of \$30 and costs, which he has elected to serve out in the county jail, making his commitment about 100 days in all.

Column of French Troops Annihilated by Arabs in Desert

PARIS, March 22.—Dispatches today tell of the virtual annihilation of a small column of French troops by Arabs in the Acheran region of western Sahara. A body of 1,000 of the intractable Berber tribe of Awellemid swooped down and surrounded the French detachment, which was marching through the shifting sands of the desert about three days' journey from Timbuktu, the French military station.

ST. PAUL, Minn., March 22.—Frank B. Kellough, president of the American Bar association, arrived at his home here today and confirmed previous reports that Viscount Haldane, lord high chancellor of England, would deliver one of the principal addresses at the association meeting next summer.

Wire Service Still Feeble and Liable to Interruption

CHICAGO, March 22.—So severe was the effect of the sleet storm yesterday on telegraph and telephone wires that it will be several weeks before the damage has been repaired completely. There was some improvement today, but at best telegraphic service was feeble and liable to interruption. Some curious routings of messages were made necessary by the prostration of the wires. It is only eighty-five miles from Chicago to Milwaukee, but press telegrams from Chicago went from Chicago to Pittsburgh, and around on a leased wire through Columbus, O., Cincinnati, Kansas City, Omaha and Minneapolis to Milwaukee. The Associated Press leased wire to Peoria was routed via Pittsburgh and St. Louis. It is estimated that the damage done to wires will aggregate \$2,000,000, the heaviest loss which the telegraph and telephone companies have suffered from storms in the last five years.

BODIES OF VICTIMS OF BLIZZARD LAID TO REST

RAPID CITY, S. D., March 22.—(Special.)—Arranged in the order of their seniority, the bodies of the six members of the Perry family, who perished on the Box Elder divide in last Friday's blizzard, lay in the Behrens' undertaking establishment Thursday while a crowd of 2,000 people passed by them to take a final look at the victims of the worst tragedy which has ever visited the Black Hills.

The bodies are encased in neat black coffins, father and mother first and then came the bodies of three little sisters and a baby brother less than a year old. The coffins rested on standards com-

These cows were purchased by Messrs. C. W. Smith and Phil Dawson of Fairbury. The stock was first shipped from Elgin, Ill., on February 20 and were bought by M. P. Knudsen of Concordia, Kan. When the cows were shipped out of Illinois they were examined and approved by Veterinary A. Tyler, and when they were shipped into Kansas, Dr. Bernard of Belleville accepted Dr. Tyler's papers, but when they were brought into Nebraska it was discovered that Dr. Tyler was not a registered veterinarian of the
