RELIEF FROM WAGE SLAVERY

Economic Independence for Women in Farm Pursuits.

HIGH REWARDS FOR LABORS

Get Women Workers on the Land, the Men Will Follow—Energy and Intelligence Insure Good Results.

"Back to the farm" is the note of economic independence for women, sounded by Mrs. Kate Trimble Woolsey, New York's commissioner to the Agricultural Institute at Rome.

In a recent number of the New York Times Mrs. Woolsey explains in detail her plans for giving effect to the farm movement which she considers the main source of relief from wage slavery for the great mass of workers.

"During the last forty years our population has almost quadrupled in dimensions, and the product from the farms is about where it was forty years ago.

Even the western rancher with his phernalia makes a pretty poor showing; his yield per acre is wastefully small, and the abandoned farm of New England situated in the very heart of the market, is an indication of where we stand in agricultural progress.

"We've been trying for the last fifteen or twenty years to get the men back to the farm. But it doesn't work. The men aren't willing to go back, and there is but one way out—to induce the women to go. We can feel pretty sure, I reckon, that the men will follow.

Haven, Louis Boehme, Thomas Hamilton, George H. Payne, Frank Parker and Rev. C. W. and Mrs. Savidge make up the balance of the board.

Mr. Savidge believes that the movement for the new home of the House of Hope is going to make rapid strides within the next three months and that it will not be long until building is under way.

The proposed home will be erected on a two-and-a-half acre tract at North Thirtieth street. It will cost in the neighborhood of \$40,000.

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At the meeting next Saturday it is possible that a fund will be set aside to pay for clerical work. The state law appropriating the \$100,000 made provision for the use of 2 1/2 per cent, or \$2,500 of the fund for clerical work.
