WOLVERINES PLAY VANDERBILT

Badgers Have Devoted Hard Week of Training in Preparation for Clash with Michigan Aggies.

CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—Arriving in line of battle their strongest battalions for a decisive conflict, Chicago and Purdue meet here tomorrow in the feature event of the day's central states foot ball program. On the outcome of the game hangs the claim of each college to the year's conference championship.

Chicago rooters take hope from their belief that Coach Stagg did not find it necessary to uncover many of his plays in the Iowa game last Saturday.

The game should be a brilliant contest of back field men with Gishpat, Applegate and O'Brien for Purdue; pitted against Norgren, Gray and Pierce.

Wolverines Meet Vanderbilt.
A game of wide interest takes place in Nashville tomorrow when Michigan meets Vanderbilt. Since its defeat by the Aggies last Saturday Coach Yost is said to have worked great improvement in the Ann Arbor team. The Dixie eleven has been brought into great shape, it is said, by Dan McGugin, a Yost pupil.

Wisconsin's veterans hope to regain prestige by downing the Michigan Agricultural team tomorrow. The Badgers, held to a tie last Saturday by Purdue, have devoted a hard week of training to preparing themselves for the team that downed Yost's men.

Gerrie, who has been hobbling about school on crutches for the last two weeks, as the result of a sprained ankle sustained in the Nebraska City game, is in condition again, and will be used in the Norfolk contest. Reese, another of the high school forwards, who broke his nose in the game with South Omaha, three weeks ago, has also recovered from his injury and has been out on the gridiron for practice every day this week.

Newby, old Colorado high school tackle last year, has been out of the city since last Saturday on account of the illness of a relative in Colorado, but returned Thursday and donned the mole skins immediately. It was rumored at first that Newby would remain away and so be out of the game for the remainder of the season and Mills is jubilant over his return.

LINCOLN, Neb., Oct. 24.—(Special.)—Nebraska's next foot ball foe, the Haskell Indians, will arrive here Saturday morning, accompanied by a big bunch of rooters. The special will carry a band of fifty pieces and a number of Indians, dressed in picturesque native costume, who propose to show the Cornhusker rooters how a real snake dance is done.

The game tomorrow is the most uncertain on the Nebraska schedule. There has not been a single line on the strength of the Indians, although it is known that Kennedy has five veteran Carlisle players on his squad. In addition the Indian coach is making the boast he will humble Nebraska and this is a decidedly new turn for Kennedy. Usually the Haskell mentor is decidedly grim before a game.

Nebraska had her last hard practice last night. The practice was rather lifeless and far from satisfactory from the coaches' standpoint. Only once during the evening did the regulars show real form and that was when Captain Purdy and Quarterback Howell picked two elevens.

Outlook Discouraging.

There was no firing for some minutes and when the smoke had cleared away the score stood 7 to 5 in favor of Towle's team. On the whole the variety outlook was a trifle discouraging, the most irritating feature being the poor tackling. All of the Nebraska squad is in good shape and should enter the Haskell contest in condition to put up a stiff fight.

DUN'S REVIEW OF TRADE

Business Situation Seen as Continuing Fairly Satisfactory.

COLDER WEATHER STIMULATING

Conditions in Iron and Steel Still Reflect Curtailment in Operations, with Additions to Idle Forces.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—Dun's Review will say tomorrow: The business situation continues fairly satisfactory, although evidences of reactionary tendency are manifest in certain branches of trade. Colder weather has stimulated both retail and wholesale distribution of seasonable merchandise. Conditions in iron and steel still reflect curtailment in operations, with additions to idle forces, and there is less optimistic sentiment. Reductions in prices are more frequent, yet railroad demands are becoming more of a feature and consumers are urging deliveries.

A better tone is apparent in the copper market. Continued favorable advices are received from leading dry goods houses.

Exports this week numbered \$40 in the United States against 23 last year, and \$61 in Canada compared with 20.

BRADSTREET'S WEEKLY REVIEW

Volume of Distributive Trade Holds Up Well.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—Bradstreet's tomorrow will say: Despite irregularities of weather and the natural ebb and flow in trade currents, the volume of distributive trade holds up well, though probably not as large as some weeks ago nor as heavy as some centers as a year ago.

The first touch of winter has benefited retail trade in winter wear clothing, dry goods, shoes and rubber goods. In the northwest this has helped orders from jobbers. In the southwest the disposition to get goods is at the base of the slackening. Early reports as to hold the day trade are good.

Business failures for the week were 24, which compares with 23 in 1912. Wheat, including flour exports for the week, are the largest for twelve years, aggregating 4,555,398 bushels against 4,55,961 last year.

EASY GAME FOR COTNERITES

University of Omaha is Defeated, 20 to 7, on Bethany Field.

FUMBLES ARE COSTLY THINGS

Line of the Men from the Metropolis Proves Weak and is Pierced Again and Again by Opponents.

LINCOLN, Neb., Oct. 24.—(Special.)—In one of the hardest fought games witnessed on Bethany field the University of Omaha team went down to defeat before the Cotner eleven this afternoon by the score of 20 to 7. Both teams put up a good exhibition of foot ball, but costly fumbles cost Omaha gains that would have counted for touchdowns.

Omaha proved weak on forward passing, losing the ball repeatedly on this form of open play. Several times Cotner men intercepted Omaha passes, making as a result two of their touchdowns. Omaha's line proved weak in the first two quarters, allowing Cotner to go through it at will.

Strain of Cotner proved to be the star man for the Bethanyites, making two of their touchdowns and being instrumental in getting their other one.

Omaha Breaks Up.

All of Cotner's touchdowns were made in the first two quarters of play, Omaha coming back strong in the second two quarters and not only holding Cotner, but forcing the play practically all in its territory.

In the third quarter Omaha came back strong and through a succession of line plunges and forward passes, sent Selby over for a touchdown.

Though playing entirely in Cotner's territory in the last two quarters Omaha was unable to score again.

For Omaha Dow, Selby, Parish and Parsons did the stellar work, while the star men for Cotner were Strain, Bawick and Bush.

In the last quarter Parish made a sensational run of seventy yards through an unbroken field for a touchdown, but it was not allowed by the officials because of holding by a member of the Omaha team.
