TIDAL WAVE ADDS TO TERRORS CAUSED BY VOLCANO ERUPTION

resembled an enormous set piece of fireworks, glowing from the foot to the summit. During the night the glowing lava illuminated the entire district. The volcano constantly emitted thunderous explosions.

The burning rock and ashes set fire to several villages. At Moji, on the Kishiu railway, one hundred persons were killed. Several villages along the foot of the volcano were buried in streams of lava yesterday.

Volcano Silent for Century. Sakura-Jima, which in violent eruption is destroying life and devastating property over extended areas in Kishiu, southernmost island of the main Japanese group, has been quiescent for more than a century, although it rears its cratered peak in a veritable land of volcanoes.

Thousands in Danger Zone. The surrounding coast and country in several directions are heavily populated and the number in the danger zone is hundreds of thousands. The chief city in danger is Kagoshima, which lies almost in the shadow of the volcano and is separated from it by a narrow strait.

Fragmentary dispatches that come in over a telegraph and telephone service that has been destroyed at several points, indicate that there has been heavy loss of life in Kagoshima and its vicinity, and it is feared that this deadly work will continue and will take a larger range when the advances are complete.

Blizzard Lashes Coast from New York to Newfoundland. BOSTON, Mass., Jan. 12.—The blizzard that gripped New England and the north-eastern part of the United States today, lashed the coast from New York to Newfoundland with a tremendous fury.

The most serious news of shipwreck came from St. John. The Royal Mail steamer Cobueque, with a crew of seventy-five and about seventy-five passengers, was blown ashore in a dangerous position off Briar Island, at the mouth of the Bay of Fundy.

When Japan refused to give satisfaction for the murder of the Englishman, Richardson, in 1862, Great Britain dispatched a squadron of several ships under Admiral Kuper, who bombarded and burned Kagose Kagoshima. The latter part of the city rests on the manufacture of the well known Satsuma creckery ware.

Five Hundred Killed. VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 12.—Further details of the devastation and loss of life caused on the island of Abrym, in the New Hebrides, by volcanic upheavals on December 4, and the following days, when cable reports told of the death of 500 people, the transformation of the coast and the throwing up of a new island from the neighboring sea were brought here yesterday by the Canadian Australian liner Makura.

Word was received at Sydney prior to the departure of the Makura that on December 6 six new craters were observed in active eruption, and on the following day Mount Minnie collapsed. Inhabitants of the danger zone were compelled to take refuge in boats which they had hardly reached when two new craters burst beneath their late holdings, overwhelming the countryside with lava on its way to the sea.

The steamer France succeeded in saving 500 natives. Most of these were old men, women and children, left behind by young, able bodied men, who at the first sign of danger took flight in canoes.

On West Side of Bay. On receiving of the first message from the Cobueque the opinion was reached that the navigator was at a loss as to the real position of the steamer and that she was in reality on the west side of the bay.

When the keeper of the Briar Island light was notified of the accident in the hope that he might give some information regarding the Cobueque, he replied that he saw no trace of her. This was subsequently confirmed by the steamer John L. Cann, which made a circuit of the island during the day.

CARMEN ASK FOR RAISE

Des Moines Men Prepare to Renew Wage Contract.

FLAT RATE WANTED FOR ALL

Declaration Made that Gradual Increase Following Continued Employment is Not Satisfactory to Men.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)
DES MOINES, Ia., Jan. 12.—(Special Telegram.)—The street car men's union, with 300 members, is preparing to ask the City Railway company for a two year wage contract, providing for a total increase of wages of \$24,000. Under the agreement between the union and the

company the present wage contract will expire March 4. The union must enter negotiations with the company before February 4.

If the union and the company are unable to agree upon a wage contract then the whole matter is placed before a board of arbitration.

At the present time two men on the cars are receiving 22 cents an hour for the first year, 24 cents an hour the second year and 26 cents an hour the third year.

Among the men there is said to be a general sentiment that conductors and motormen should receive a flat rate from the time they are placed on the payroll. The men will ask for 35 cents an hour straight.

Petition of German Women is Referred

BERLIN, Jan. 12.—A petition from the German Women's Suffrage union asking to be accorded the vote at elections for the Imperial Parliament was today referred to the government without any recommendation by the members of the Reichstag. A socialist deputy pointed out that "this action of the House is equivalent to throwing the petition into the waste basket."

GAME PRESERVE WILL BE CREATED AT WEBSTER CITY

WEBSTER CITY, Ia., Jan. 12.—(Special.)—The first state game preserve in Iowa will probably be established just south of Webster City. State Fish and Game Warden Hinshaw is arranging with local sportsmen a plan to set aside 20,000 acres which will be stocked by the state and maintained as a permanent game preserve. The theory is the game put in the preserve and protected will propagate and furnish a permanent game supply for this section of the state.

All that a farmer within the preserve is required to do is to sign a paper that he is willing hunting be prohibited on his farm for all time. The state of Iowa has already purchased 5,000 pairs of Hungarian partridges which will be landed in New York this week to be liberated over the state. These and ringneck pheasants will be largely used on game preserves. Later other game will be liberated on the preserves. But for the protection afforded game on the preserves Iowa would soon have no wild animals worth shooting.

Mostly Held in Europe. Although the great bulk of the Mexican national debt is held in Europe, it is expected that such powers will continue to allow the United States to lead the external policies towards Mexico with the intention of later looking to Washington for support in their demands for protection of the financial interests of their subjects.


The principal internal and external loans of Mexico are held for the most part in the United States. Great Britain, France and Germany. Their denominations and dates of payment of the coupons are as follows:

Forty-three million, three hundred and twenty-nine thousand, two hundred and fifty dollars consolidated internal 5 per cent silver bonds, coupons payable on June 30 and December 31; \$96,322,000 5 per cent internal redeemable bonds, coupons payable April 1 and October 1; \$12,560,000 5 per cent external consolidated gold loan of 1891, coupons payable January 1, April 1, July 1 and October 1; \$4,000,000 4 per cent gold bonds of 1894, coupons payable June 1 and December 1.
