

AMES ATHLETIC CONVENTION

Honors Awarded at Special Meeting of the Students.

NEW PLAN IS POPULAR

President Pearson Presides and Emblems Are Presented by Prof. S. W. Beyer—Honors Also Awarded.

AMES, Ia., Jan. 27.—(Special.)—At a special convocation in Agricultural hall assembly, yesterday, honors were awarded normally before the entire student body. The convocation method of publicly bestowing the varsity letters was innovated last year, and it then was so successful that it was decided to repeat it again this year.

President Pearson presided and Prof. S. W. Beyer presided over the convocation. The convocation of students probably was the largest ever packed into Agricultural auditorium, which seats 800.

President Pearson conferred original significance that might well be attached to the initial A. He said: "The letter stood for 'ability, ambition, anxiety to realize ambition and achievement.'"

Fraternity Players Are Allowed to Sign Minor League Pacts

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—The Base Ball Players' fraternity today withdrew its order instructing players not to sign minor league contracts, a satisfactory agreement having been reached with the leading minor leagues of the National association. President Davis L. Pitts said:

"For the last two days the Base Ball Players' fraternity has been in communication with Mr. Harrow, president of the International Association of Professional Baseball Players, and Mr. Chivington of the American association and Judge Kavanaugh, president of the Southern association, all empowered to act for the Western league. We are assured by these gentlemen that the understanding of the disposition made of the side agreement clause at Cincinnati is the same as that entertained by Mr. Herrmann and myself.

We have been assured that all contracts signed by players in these leagues will be subject to the provision already inserted by the National commission in the major league contracts so far as the clause suspending players is concerned; also that contracts signed in the future will have the clause stricken irreversibly of what action the National association takes.

Although the association still persists in its arbitrary stand, rather than further collaboration the gentlemen named who have been absolutely fair in all their dealings with us we are notifying our members that the objection to signing contracts is withdrawn.

BALTIMORE FEDS GET THREE MORE PLAYERS

BALTIMORE, Md., Jan. 27.—Manager Otto Knabe of the Baltimore Federal league base ball club on his return today from a western trip, said he had signed three new players while away. He refused to give their names, but said that two of them were major league cases and the third played with a minor league team last year, but belonged to a big league club. Southern Pines, N. 
TY COBB WILL JOIN THE TIGER REGULARS IN MARCH
