

YES, indeed, I was one of the 10,000 who attended the Suffrage ball in New York, along with Mrs. Stuyvesant Fish and her entire household down to the laundress.

The part that appealed most to me was the lack of snobbishness at this affair. New Yorkers who are famed for their snobbishness seem to be really forgetting this in their earnestness in the suffrage cause. Tickets for the ball were sold on the streets, and young women selling tickets were kept busy taking in money.

At the ball a large number of men prominent in suffrage were on the floor committee and were wearing the badges.

The armory just across the street from the Vanderbilt hotel was selected as the place for the ball to be given. Besides the immense floor space for dancing, there is a small balcony, and this was elaborately decorated with the suffrage banners. Many of these banners have been carried in every large suffrage parade held in this country, and so are becoming historic.

In the balcony there were blocks of seats reserved for women who take part in the world's work. In one section were authors, in another newspaper women, and so on.

Furthermore, I noticed that the suffragists were unusually good dancers and seemed quite expert in the graceful Brazilian Maxixe, which has succeeded the tango.
