ATTACKS PEACE SOCIETY

O'Gorman Says Purpose is to Promote British-American Alliance.

SCOTT BEFORE LOBBY PROBERS

Secretary of Carnegie Endowment Is Asked About Panama Tolls Propaganda—De Knight Has Collapse.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—James Brown Scott, secretary of the Carnegie endowment for international peace, testified today before the senate lobby committee. He submitted the financial statements of contributions and contributors to the support of the institution and record of disbursements.

Inquiry into the endowment was precipitated by the charge made in executive session of the senate by Senator O'Gorman that its main purpose was not to promote international peace, but to bring about a British-American alliance in the interest of a selected few who supported the institution.

Senator O'Gorman is leading the fight in the senate against repeal of the Panama canal tolls exemption, and the lobby committee sought to find if men interested in the endowment were in any way interested in that issue.

The \$50,000 annual revenue of the endowment is derived from bonds of the United States Steel corporation.

Senator Walsh asked particularly as to an annual contribution of \$1,000 to the American Peace society. Secretary Scott said that organization was headed by Senator Burton, and that it distributed to smaller organizations throughout the country documents dealing with the peace propaganda. He agreed to produce copies of all which deal with general arbitration or canal tolls exemption.

Further inquiry into the peace endowment records brought to light an allotment of \$7,000 in 1913 for "propaganda for Panama tolls." That sum, it was disclosed, never was expended and still is carried on the books.

Clarence W. DeKnight, the Washington lawyer examined yesterday, suffered a nervous collapse and was unable to appear. He had promised to produce his contract with former Admiral Bowles, head of the Fore River Ship-Building company, for work for a Panama tolls exemption. Bowles denies that DeKnight had such a contract.

German Minister for War Defends Dueling in Diet

Berlin, March 12.—Duelling among officers in the German army was strongly defended today by Lieutenant General Erich von Falkenhayn, minister for war, in replying to an interpellation regarding the fatal duel at Metz on February 26, when Lieutenant Haage was killed. The minister for war said the institution of duelling was a necessity for the military caste. He made it clear that his efforts to diminish duelling in the army were directed, not against the duel, but toward the restriction of the number of cases in which an encounter was regarded as imperative.

"I personally would consider it a misfortune," he said, "if the conception of personal honor on which the practice of duelling is based, should be eradicated. I admit that duelling is an offense under the laws, both of God and of man, and is an evidence of physical, rather than of moral, courage. Moreover, the penalty is liable to fall on the wronged man. Nevertheless, an officer must be the defender of his own honor and is entitled to regain his self-esteem, to vindicate his manhood and to repel the imputation of lack of courage by facing his adversary, pistol in hand."

Duelling, according to the minister, is decreasing in Germany. "There were only twelve duels in 1913," he said, "among the 75,000 active and reserve officers in the German army, but this rate is still too high. The fatal duel at Metz could have been avoided if Lieutenant Haage had waited until the court of honor had considered the case, but the officer had felt deeply insulted and refused to do so, with the result that he was killed."

Mining Promoters Are Convicted of Misuse of Mails

NEW YORK, March 12.—John J. Meyers and Archie L. Wisner were found guilty in the federal court today of using the mails to defraud by the sale of mining stocks through A. B. Wisner & Co.

Wisner was sentenced to serve six years in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta. Meyers, a reputed millionaire, received a similar term and was fined \$10,000.

The defendants, particularly Meyers, who came to New York to stand trial of his own accord and bears many credentials from men of standing in San Francisco, where he is well known, urged their counsel to impress on the court that they had no disposition to leave the jurisdiction.

Meyers and Wisner were engaged in promoting the sale of mining stocks through the mails when their offices were raided and they were arrested. Investigators, it was charged by the government, lost more than \$1,000,000 through the operations of the defendants. They were tried once before, but the jury failed to agree.

Bodies Sunk With Steamer Monroe Swept Out to Sea

WASHINGTON, March 12.—All the bodies which sank with the Old Dominion liner Monroe when it was rammed by the Nantucket off the Virginia coast on January 30 have been swept out of the wreck by a strong submarine current.

Divers, having nearly 200 additional pounds of lead on their equipment, found it impossible to remain on their feet in the fierce current which sweeps about the wreck. Forty-three lives were lost in the collision. How many of those went down imprisoned in the ship is not known, but there was hope of recovering some bodies.

Divers also found that lifeboat No. 1, which some witnesses at the government's investigation testified was smashed in the collision had been cut loose, as one witness testified. The cargo may be recovered.

Moving Picture Made of Duel Between Prominent Parisians

PARIS, March 12.—A sword duel fought today between Jacques Richepin, son of Jean Richepin, the "Immortal," and Pierre Frondaie, author of a play now being performed in Paris, resulted in the wounding of Frondaie.

The quarrel arose out of an incident in the lobby of a theater on Wednesday. Madame Frondaie, it is alleged, made some cutting remarks to Jacques Richepin's wife, known as Madame Cora Laparvotte, who is co-manager of the theater.

M. Frondaie took full responsibility for his wife's comments and was thereupon challenged to fight by M. Richepin.

The encounter took place in the suburbs of Neuilly. More than 100 notable literary and dramatic men, numerous reporters, photographers and moving picture operators watched the combat.

The wives of both principals appeared on the scene, but were not allowed to watch the combat. They remained on the road outside in their automobiles, where they were surrounded by crowds of women friends. They could hear the sounds of the clashing of swords.

Servant Who Often Posed as Employer Commits Suicide

PHOENIX, Ariz., March 12.—Dividing her time between cooking at a fashionable apartment house, giving luncheons at a leading hotel on her afternoons off and trying to buy a music school, a woman who asserted she was Mme. Arriola, wife of a noted San Francisco musician, ended several weeks of deception here by committing suicide.

Instead of being Mme. Arriola herself, she was a former cook in that family, according to the police, who say that a young woman from San Francisco recognized her about the time that papers had been drawn for her purchase of the Arizona School of Music.

In a dying statement she told the police her maiden name was Lillian May Biechele, and that she came from a wealthy Pittsburgh family. She swallowed poison last night while at a private party and died at a hospital.

On taking a position as cook here it is said she represented herself to outsiders as a chaperone for a party of young women.

The police say the San Francisco woman who recognized the masquerader as the former Arriola servant told them of a similar adventure in San Francisco. According to this story the dead woman posed as Mme. Arriola, when her mistress was out of the city, and in company with other servants gave a dinner at one of the leading hotels there.
