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Jay Gould Wins the World's Indoor Tennis Tourney

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., March 18.—Jay Gould, the noted American amateur court tennis champion, won the professional championship of the world here today from George F. Covey of England, the professional title holder. The American champion, in one of the finest exhibitions of the game ever seen here, carried off the title, seven sets to one. The scores of the match were 4-6, 6-4, 6-4, 6-2, 6-1, 6-0.

The American expert won four sets of Monday in such easy fashion that the result was virtually a foregone conclusion. Gould's playing in the four sets today was fully up to that of the first Saturday. The British champion fought hard to the very end, taking the third set of the day and the seventh of the match in fine style.
