### Paving Bids for New Work Higher Than Last Year

Bids for paving in twelve districts, requiring an expenditure of approximately \$75,000, were opened by the city council, and according to the chief clerk of the engineering department are considerably higher than the bids received last year.

New paving specifications have been adopted and these, it is said, have caused the increase. The Commercial Land company, which has heretofore entered bids for Bedford stone curbing, did not bid.

Asphalt and brick bids were higher, but brick remained about the same. "Some of the work done under the old specifications was rotten," said Chief Clerk Ed Peterson of the city engineering department, "and it is to be expected that high bids are in order."

It is not surprising that some of the bidders have dropped out, for tests of the material they used show that the material does not generally stand up to specifications.

Commissioner Thomas McGovern of the department of public improvements says the paving work is even now being started, and before the summer is here, if the weather remains warm, a large amount of work will have been accomplished.

McGovern believes the paving operations this season will exceed in extent the work of any previous year.

### Burbank Exhibit May Come to the Low Cost of Living Show

Many important details were passed upon Monday at a special meeting of the executive committee of the Omaha Retail Grocers' association, promoters of the National Low Cost of Living show, which will be held in the Omaha Auditorium, April 15 to 25. It has dawned upon the retailers of food products that the forthcoming exposition is to be of even greater magnitude than at first contemplated.

Reports of the manager were read, showing that nearly all of the exhibit spaces were disposed of. There are less than fifteen to sell.

There is a chance for a big Lather Burbank exhibit and the committee on exhibits reported that the Department of Agriculture at Washington will send here six big cases of exhibits of a most instructive and educational nature. The weight of these will exceed 4,000 pounds.

### RESTRICT ADDRESSES AT GENERAL DELIVERY

Under the stern rule of Uncle Sam, secret love correspondence by the general delivery method is frowned upon and discouraged. No longer can love-sick youths and maidens have their sweethearts address them in care of the general delivery window instead of their homes. The Postoffice department has ruled that minors may not receive mail through the general delivery department, and that all persons residing in the city must have their mail delivered by carrier to their homes, instead of calling for it at the postoffice. As a result, the number of patrons of the Omaha general delivery department has been reduced over 500. One less clerk is needed and greater economy and efficiency has been secured.

### MARINE OFFICER HAS COVERED 58,593 MILES

Since enlisting in the United States marine corps in Omaha seven years ago Sergeant Rizer F. Westergard has traveled 58,593 miles in the marine service. He is now in charge of the recruiting station at 1406 Farnam street, and by way of inducing other Omahans to join the marines states that all men enlisted in this district at the present time probably will have an opportunity to visit the Panama canal and the exposition at San Francisco in 1915. Men now being enlisted are transferred to Marc Island, Cal.

### Must Pay Revenue Tax Whether Cigars Are Made or Not

So closely do revenue officers watch the production of cigars that when a factory fails to make the usual number of perfectos out of each pound of leaf tobacco it buys, the revenue service knows of the shortage and forces the factory to pay the tax on the discrepancy, nevertheless. According to government estimate each pound of tobacco should produce forty cigars and the tax is levied in that proportion. Record is kept of all sales of leaf tobacco and of cigar stamps to factories. Six in the state were recently required to pay taxes amounting to \$20 on cigars which they failed to make, but which the revenue officials figured they should have made out of the raw leaf purchased.

### MARKETING WEEK A SUCCESS

Jobbers Declare it Will Be Made a Semi-Annual Feature.

FOR EACH SPRING AND FALL

Visiting Merchants Are Being Entertained by the Jobbers—Big Banquet Planned for Wednesday Evening at Home.

It was estimated yesterday by wholesalers and manufacturers that over 400 retail merchants from Nebraska and adjoining states are already in Omaha, taking advantage of merchant's marketing week, inaugurated by the Omaha wholesalers and manufacturers this year. The big wholesale houses in the city were doing a great business. Many of them had their places crowded with out-of-town buyers.

Besides Nebraska men there were dozens from South Dakota, quite a number from Kansas, some few from Wyoming, and scores from Iowa. The coming of a great number of Kansas merchants was especially encouraging to the Omaha business men and before noon the jobbers and manufacturers declared merchant's marketing week had proven a greater success than they had even anticipated. It was declared that merchant's marketing week as a permanent institution is now established, and that there shall be a spring and fall marketing week regularly hereafter.

Many of the wholesale houses reserve tables and dining rooms at the Commercial club and at the various hotels where they entertained their guests and customers at luncheon. Each establishment in Omaha will entertain some of its own customers and guests while a general program was prepared for last evening and again for this evening. This evening there is to be a large banquet for the guests at the Hotel Home. The local committee has already arranged for 500 plates for this banquet.
