BARKER DIES FROM WOUND

Victim of Crazed South Omaha Tailor Succumbs to Bullet.

HAD BROODED OVER DESERTION

Dresser Grew Morose When His Crazy and Roommate Left Him to Take Up Quarters at Industrial Home.

John Barker, 22 years old, victim of Walter J. Dresser, the crazed tailor who shot himself Saturday night at 307 N. street, South Omaha, after having shot at Dave Callahan and wounded Barker, died Monday morning at 1 o'clock in the South Omaha hospital. Barker's death resulted from the bullet wound through the body in the neighborhood of the heart. Barker told Rev. T. C. O'Callaghan of St. Bridget's church that he had five brothers in Lake Forest, Ill. The priest at once notified Frank Barker of Lake Forest of the imminent death of his brother in the South Omaha. Barker is said to have been the son of a Lake Forest contractor. He is also said to have been married twice.

Barker's death followed a jocular remark made by him to his former roommate and crazy, Dresser, Saturday night. The men had lived together for some months until recently, when Barker left the South Omaha tailor to room at the Industrial home in Omaha. Dresser is said to have brooded over the desertion of Barker. When Barker and Callahan returned to South Omaha to visit Saturday night, Dresser showed temper over the affair. Later Barker twitted Dresser with being mentally unbalanced. "People say you're nuts," he told Dresser. "What do you think about it?" he asked Callahan. Dresser stepped into an adjoining room, where he procured a gun. His reply to the twitting was a shot at Callahan, who escaped unharmed, and two shots at Barker. A fourth shot Dresser sent through his own brain. Dresser is said to have relatives residing at 1514 Colfax avenue, Minneapolis. A telegram from B. J. Larkin, at whose undertaking parlors Dresser's body is held, brought word that there was no such address. Barker's body will be held by Undertaker Morgan Heafey until word is received from Lake Forest relatives.
