tempt is made to ill-treat American civilians. The same is true as to the navy yard and it is declared Admiral Fletcher has been so tolerant as to permit a whole shipload of Mexican troops to depart from Vera Cruz harbor without molestation, when he could easily have captured them. Reports emanating from Mexico City last night that an American warship had bombarded Manzanillo, on the Pacific coast of Mexico, and that American marines had landed at Salina Cruz, caused officials here considerable concern. Both reports being untrue, they feared they might have been circulated in Mexico for the purpose of arousing resentment against Americans. The hope here is that no untoward incidents will arise to hamper the peace negotiations.

South American Ministers Call.

At the morning meeting several of the South American ministers and members of the mediation were called into conference. It was understood this related to a plan advanced by some of the South American countries to have all of their representatives join as a semi-official part of the mediation procedure. It is the expectation, however to continue the organization as now formally accepted by all elements, and at the same time the co-operation and backing of the United Republics of South America and central America.

MORE REFUGEES IN VERA CRUZ

WASHINGTON, APRIL 30.--Movement of Americans out of Mexico continued to go forward steadily and encouraging reports are coming to the State and Navy departments from all quarters. Admiral Badger reported that all American refugees now are out of the Tampico district. There has been no killing of Americans in the vicinity of Tampico, the admiral added and little interference although considerable anti-American feeling exists and anti-American demonstrations have occurred. The admiral added that the Denver had not landed any men at Salina Cruz.

Urdike Elevator at Eldorado Destroyed

HARVARD, Neb., April 30.--(Special Telegram.)--The Urdike elevator and lumber yard at Eldorado, seven miles northeast of this city on the Northwestern road, was entirely destroyed by fire this afternoon with a loss exceeding \$25,000. The blaze was discovered in the elevator between 12 and 1 o'clock while the men were at dinner. The elevator contained several thousand bushels of grain. The manager had been cleaning up and shipping. A considerable quantity of wood was also stored in the building. The wind carried the fire to the lumber yard and that was soon beyond control, there being no fire fighting apparatus in the village. Much other property narrowly escaped and was only saved by desperate efforts.

Huerta Agent Buys Arms in Japan

TOKIO, April 30.--General Velasquez of the Mexican army, who has been in Japan on government business, has left Yokohama on board the steamer Sejo Maru for Manzanillo. He has been recalled by Huerta, ostensibly to render assistance in the present crisis. The general left Yokohama very quietly. Under the name of Valero he purchased arms in Japan from private firms for his government. The Sejo Maru carries a consignment of provisions for the Japanese cruiser Irumo, which is to remain in Mexican waters. Japan, there is good reason to believe, is anxious to hold aloof in the Mexican situation. It is declared among diplomats here that it declined to represent Mexico at Washington in the fear that acceptance might be misinterpreted abroad as an indication of unfriendliness to the United States or of special friendliness to Mexico.

NEBRASKA DELEGATION WILL ENTER PROTEST OVER BANK

(From a Staff Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, April 30.--(Special Telegram.)--Although Secretary McAdoo, on the part of the organization committee of the federal reserve board has advised Senator Hitchcock, representing the Nebraska delegation in congress, that it will be practically useless for the delegation to appear before the committee in an effort to secure a change in the matter of the regional bank for the district in which Nebraska is placed, the delegation is inclined to insist upon the hearing it has asked for through Mr. Hitchcock. Inasmuch as the secretary has advised the latter that a hearing would be arranged for before himself, Secretary Houston and Comptroller of the Currency Williams if the delegation under the circumstances still wished it, Mr. McAdoo was notified this afternoon by the senator that was the distinct wish of the delegation. It is therefore believed that the meeting will be held before the organization committee within a few days. It will be a meeting of protest in which the Wyoming delegation will participate with the one from Nebraska. James L.
