Local Investors in Carolina Gold Mine Receive Good News

C. R. Courtney, and William Hims, banker at Benson, N. C., returning from Winston-Salem, N. C., report that the Gross & Dixon Gold Mining company's mine in that locality has struck a vein of ore that assays \$422 to the ton. For the last six years Omaha, Hooper and Benson people have been putting out money for development work on the mining property and while a low grade find was expected, it was never estimated that so rich a vein would be struck as the one described by the investors who have just returned with the company's secretary, W. G. McKay.

The location is right at the foot of the Blue Ridge mountains and the new find was made at a ninety-six-foot level. PENROSE REPLIES TO T. R.

Pennsylvania Senator Answers the Attack Made Upon Him.

CITES LETTER FROM COLONEL

Asserts Roosevelt's Course in Forcing Taft's Nomination in 1908 Most Offensive Act of Bossism.

PITTSBURGH, July 1.—United States Senator Boies Penrose, who was in this city tonight, gave out a statement replying to Colonel Roosevelt's speech before the mass meeting of the Progressive league. The senator referred to the rebuke of bossism, and continued:

"It is difficult for me to determine just when Mr. Roosevelt reached the conclusion to which he refers. It certainly was not in 1904, when the returns from Pennsylvania in the presidential election in that year were sent to him by me as chairman of the republican state committee, and to which I received from him, in reply, the following letter: 'My Dear Senator Penrose: Upon my word, of all phenomenal returns, the returns from Pennsylvania are most phenomenal. I congratulate and cordially thank you. Faithfully yours, Theodore Roosevelt.'

"In fact, during the whole period of Mr. Roosevelt's presidency, my relations with him were cordial. I co-operated with him in nearly all of his policies as a member of the United States senate; and when certain potential elements in the republican party were plotting to defeat Mr. Roosevelt for the nomination in 1904, I, as chairman of the republican state committee of Pennsylvania, was most active in having him endorsed at our state convention. I operated in forcing similar resolutions on the state convention in Ohio which occurred very soon afterwards, against the opposition of Mr. Hanna.

"As chairman of the republican state committee of Pennsylvania, in the same year, I was largely instrumental in giving the splendid majority to which the letter above mentioned refers. 'I am further informed that Mr. Roosevelt refers to the fact that I opposed him for nomination at the republican national convention in 1912, and I take it that this is the real reason for his change of attitude. Men are apt to be bosses to their enemies and leaders to their friends.

"Even Mr. Roosevelt cannot escape the frailties of human nature. I exercised my privilege as a republican and as a United States Senator to use my own judgment as to what course I should follow in the presidential contest of that year. I pursued the course I took, not for any personal or selfish reason, but for what I considered to be to the advantage of the republican party and of the people of Pennsylvania.

"Mr. Roosevelt had assured me in the most positive terms that his ambition had been fully satisfied and that under no circumstances would he ever be a candidate again for the presidency. He assured many members of the United States senate and prominent republicans from all over the country to the same effect. He had taken himself, as far as we were informed, entirely out of consideration in connection with this office.

"In the republican national convention, Mr. Roosevelt, at no time, had a majority of the convention. I cannot, in the limits of this statement go into details as I would like to do. As the campaign progresses, should this discussion be continued, I shall be glad to meet all comers and all questions. It is sufficient to say that the rules which the convention acted, regarding delegates, and all other matters of procedure, were precisely the rules which Mr. Roosevelt had insisted on in the national convention of 1908.

"It will be recalled that Mr. Roosevelt had absolutely named Mr. Taft for the presidency. Whether Mr. Roosevelt considers this an act of bossism or not I do not know, but to me at that time, it seemed like the most offensive act of bossism that could be perpetrated in American politics.

"In 1908, in the convention of which I am speaking Mr. Roosevelt, who through a cabinet officer, who was in full charge and in hourly communication with the White House, insisted on defeating any rule proposed to alter the system of southern representation, it was defeated on the floor of the convention absolutely through the boss orders issued by Mr. Roosevelt's personal and official representative and the southern representation was maintained as heretofore.

"Delegates elected for Fairbanks were ruthlessly thrown out by the committee on credentials. All the other contests of delegates opposed to Mr. Taft were treated in about as coldblooded a way as I have ever witnessed in my attendance on meetings of the national committee in twenty years. The convention was organized and nominated for Taft.

"'Fake Contests' Gotten Up.
"When the convention of 1912 came around the convention was called upon to organize under the rules which Mr. Roosevelt had forced upon the party against my protest and that of my republican assistants four years previous. If there was anything defective in the rules it was the one who made an effort to have them corrected, and he was the one, through his direct representative, who tried to have my efforts defeated. A large number of purely fake contests were gotten up at the last moment, after Mr. Roosevelt had reached his belated determination to become a candidate, from the southern states. They had no merit, and, of course, the committee on credentials decided against them.

"The motives ascribed to me by Mr. Roosevelt to the effect that my course was dictated by any desire to share in the control of the republican party, even at the risk of party defeat, are too silly for me to give serious consideration. 'I have not, of course, opportunity to discuss Mr. Roosevelt's charges in full; neither am I called upon, I suppose, to do so at this time. His generalities, of course, are commendable; his specific recommendations about a commission to regulate business and a commission to legislate for the tariff are, to my mind, superficial and fraught with very great dangers. Certainly, the tariff legislation should not be delayed by the interminable investigations of any more tariff commissions.

"We demand a republican majority in the house and senate, and a republican president at the earliest opportunity to pass in the course of two or three months a tariff bill which will afford adequate protection and bring about a return of prosperity to the country. The people are sick and tired of theorists and demagogues whom they have listened to long enough. They are now demanding practical results and an early restoration of prosperity."

Oldfield to Drive at Sioux City Race

Harney Oldfield, one of the best known racing pilots in the world, will be one of the principal attractions of the 300-mile race at Sioux City on July 4, when he is to drive in the 50-mile International sweepstakes at Indianapolis on May 30 and won fifth place, finishing ahead of all other American entries. The wonderful showing Harney made at Indianapolis will undoubtedly make the Stutz car one of the favorites at Sioux City. Gil Anderson, winner of the 1913 Elgin National road race, will pilot the second Stutz entry and Gil is liable to repeat his Elgin victory on July 4.

WITHNELL FIGURES TOO HIGH

The Bee Building Company Shows Council How to Save on Heating.

QUESTIONS VACUUM SYSTEM COST

Withnell Says It Would Cost \$7,350 and Building Company Says It Cost Only \$1,300 to Put System in Bee Building.

A letter from The Bee Building company to the city commission in which was suggested the proposition that bids for connecting the city hall with The Bee building for heating purposes be advertised for was read and placed on file by the city council at a meeting called to consider the advisability of installing a new heating plant at the city hall for \$12,750 or accepting The Bee Building

company's offer to heat the city hall for \$1,450 a year.

City Commissioner C. H. Withnell's statistical report on the heating plant bids said \$7,350 would be required to install the proposed vacuum system. The letter from The Bee Building company stated that The Bee Building a year ago was equipped with the vacuum return system at a cost of \$1,300.

Letter to Council.
Following is the letter to the council from The Bee Building company:

"We note that a report on city hall heating is to have consideration at a meeting of the city council to which Mr. Hanighen is specially invited as a personally interested party. We note also that this report recommends letting a contract to Mr. Hanighen to install a new heating plant in the city hall on his bid of \$12,750 regardless of the proposal to furnish all needed heat for \$1,450 per year at a saving to the city of over \$3,000.

return system for the city hall would be \$7,350.

"For your information we beg to say that the cost of putting a vacuum return system in The Bee building, with much more piping and many more radiators by contract than in the city hall, was \$1,300, exclusive of the pump, the work being done by contract only about a year ago.

"If it is your purpose to avoid waste of the taxpayers' money we would suggest (further that the only true basis of comparing this cost would be by inviting competitive bids for the work which would be required to connect with The Bee building plant, which, on proper specifications, might not cost over \$2,500, all told."
