DENVER WINS, TEN TO THREE

Willis Blows Up in the Fifth and Grizzlies Score at Will.

BIG ARGUMENT IN THE FOURTH

Krug and Styles Mix with Umpire Van Sycle Over Ground Rules and Both Former Go to Club House.

DENVER, Sept. 9.—(Special Telegram.)—In the fourth inning of today's game, Barbour lammed the ball into left field with Coffey on base ahead of him. Umpire Van Sycle ruled that it was a home run. An argument followed and before the smoke cleared away Krug and Styles had scuffled their way to the club house. Willis blew up in the next inning and Denver won the game, 10 to 3, after it had appeared that the Rockies were scheduled to pluck a victory. Difference of opinion was over the question of ground rules which hold a runner to third when the ball is sent into the automobiles. Van Sycle contended the ball landed in the clear, while Manager Gondling through it bounced the machine's.

BOSTON, Sept. 9.—Boston increased its lead in the National league pennant race today by breaking even in a double header with Philadelphia while New York was losing. The second game, which Boston won, 7 to 3, after losing the first by 10 to 3, was marked by a no-hit, no-run pitching performance by one of the recruit pitchers, Davis, formerly of the New York Americans. He was wild at times, filling the bases in the fifth, with none out, but he recovered control and retired the side without a run. Umpire Quigley was rendered unconscious in the second inning of the second game when he was hit on the throat by a foul tip, but gamely resumed his duties in the fourth inning with an ice pack about his throat.
