

## SOX CHICAGO CHAMPIONS

American Leaguers Come from Behind and Trample Cubs.

**SERIES GOES THE SEVEN GAMES**

Cumbersome Men for Fourth Consecutive Time Triumph Over National Rivals of the Diamond.

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—The Chicago American league club today won the final game of the series to decide the championship of Chicago when it defeated its National league rival, 3 to 2. This is the fourth consecutive time that the American league has triumphed over the local Nationals. The series went the full seven games, the American leaguers winning three straight.

The American league came from behind and won the game on two hits. With the Nationals leading by two runs, the Americans fought hard. Weaver started the fourth inning by getting a base when Derrick fumbled his sharp grounder. The next two men were retired easily on fly balls. Humphries could not locate the plate, and Fournier drew a base on balls. Both caught a ball on the outside of the plate and doubled over first base, scoring Weaver and Fournier. Demmitt followed with a base on balls and Schalk singled to right center, scoring Roth. Vaughn then replaced Humphries and retired the side after the damage had been done.

The total paid attendance was 14,678. The gross receipts were \$3,321.25. Of this amount the National commission's 10 per cent was \$332.12, and each club received \$4,019.88. Score: R. H. E. ## Haskell Indian is Grandson of Chief Logan Fontenelle

When the Haskell Indians line up against Creighton university at Omaha Saturday there will be in its backfield someone during the game one bearing a name familiar to the people of Omaha, "Hank" Fontenelle, after whose grandfather, Logan Fontenelle, the new hotel of Omaha is named. Logan Fontenelle, chief of the Omaha tribe of Indians now on a reservation about sixty miles from this city, was a capable leader of his people and a noted buffalo hunter. The original home of this tribe was at Bellevue, only a few miles from Omaha, and in fact many is the time that chief Fontenelle's band pitched their tents exactly where the business portion of the city now lies. "Hank" tells the story himself that his grandfather met his death at the hands of the fierce and war-like Sioux while on one of his buffalo hunts. He was taken by surprise and in his attempt to get under shelter his pony was led in the mist which made it impossible for him to make his get-away.

## All-Star Base Ball Teams Ready to Start

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—Players who are to make up the all-star clubs of the American and National leagues will assemble here tomorrow, it was announced today, for their post season tour, which opens in Milwaukee on Saturday.

The American league club will be under the management of Connie Mack, leader of the Philadelphia Athletics. Frank Bancroft, business manager of the Cincinnati Nationals, will have charge of this National league players.

After playing in the principal cities in California, the clubs will sail for Honolulu on November 25 and return shortly after the first of the year.

"Big Bill" James, whose pitching aided the Boston club in defeating the Athletics in the world's series, will be a member of the Nationals all-star pitching staff.

## M'MILLEN FLIES OVER CITY

Little Aviator Remains in Air for Twenty-Four Minutes.

## GOES UP AT SPEEDWAY SUNDAY

To Fly Over City Today and Tomorrow and on Sunday Will Make Fancy Flights at Stadium Speedway.

Ralph E. McMillen, the aviator who was scheduled to fly at the stadium speedway last Sunday and was unable on account of the rain, made a flight over Omaha, South Omaha and Council Bluffs yesterday afternoon, remaining in the air for twenty-four minutes before coming down. McMillen made a beautiful flight over the three cities and proved to the satisfaction of Omaha that he is a qualified aviator.

McMillen found the flying over Omaha extremely hazardous, as the smoke, even at 5,000 feet, was so intense that it affected his breathing. He circled the downtown district once and then made a line for South Omaha. Returning to Omaha he crossed the river and circled Council Bluffs at Pearl and Broadway. At that point he reached the maximum altitude. He was 4,500 feet in the air and over the clouds. Coming back with the wind McMillen registered a speed of 100 miles an hour.

**Makes Pretty Landing.**  
The little aviator flies in a Curtiss biplane. In the short distance of 100 yards at the stadium speedway he started upward. He ripped along the rough ground for a ways and then his plane began to climb. When he landed he dropped in the same spot and stopped in fifty yards, making a most scientific and pretty landing. He flew close over a little grove of trees, skipped past a couple of telephone wires and came to a stop a few feet from where he had started.

The day was clear and the air currents even, but it was intensely cold in the upper regions and when McMillen came down he was numb from head to foot. Remaining in the air and traveling at from seventy to 100 miles an hour is child's business on a day like yesterday, according to McMillen, and he only stayed up so long because he wishes to convince everybody that he is an able aviator.

**Flies Rest of Week.**  
McMillen will fly again today shortly after 1 o'clock and at the same hour Saturday. Sunday he will make several flights at the stadium speedway and will battle with six motorcycles in a race around the auditor track. McMillen's manager attempted to take him to Kansas City for Sunday, but McMillen refused to go, and to prevent the manager from acting an attachment was levied against the biplane by the Speedway company. McMillen will perform some fancy flying at the speedway Sunday, but today and tomorrow will only do straight flying.

**Stallings and Carrigan Agree.**  
Both Stallings and Carrigan, respectively, of the Braves and Red Sox, are believers in the theory that it is a greater strain on a pitcher to warm up and keep in readiness to pitch than it is to pitch a game. This has been scoffed at by many managers. Stallings has worked with Carrigan and Tyler as nearly in regular turns as was possible. Crutcher, Cochran and Hean, and later, Davis, were kept on the warming rack, ready to rush to the relief of the stars.

## CREIGHTON WEIGHS ONE TON

Haskell Indians One Pound Per Man Lighter Than Their Rivals.

## TEAMS BOTH IN FINE SHAPE

Twenty-Five Redskins Will Make Trip to Omaha, on Their Only Northern Visit for Football Season.

When Creighton and Haskell Indians stage their annual game on Creighton field at 3 o'clock Saturday, practically one ton of redskin beef will mix with white meat. According to advance dope given out by both teams, the eleven men which will start the game for each team will tip the beam at practically a ton for each squad. Creighton outweighs the Indians by one pound, averaging 175 pounds, while the boys from Lawrence weigh 174.

The Creighton weight is due to the heavy line, where they far outweigh the Indians. The Creighton team, from tackle to tackle, weighs 134 pounds while Haskell weighs 128. This is the only place where the local boys are heavier. Haskell outweighs Creighton in the backfield, tipping the beam at 171, which is ten pounds greater than the locals. The Indians ends are also big, weighing 175, also ten pounds heavier than the local ends.

The Indians will bring a squad of twenty-five men as this is their only northern trip of the year. Two of their number, Artchoker and Fontenelle—live in Nebraska. Fontenelle belongs to the Omaha tribe. The Indians names of the players presents a weird list of longish wistlers and ancient tribal enemies are found fighting side by side for the glory of Haskell. Seventeen tribes are represented.
