## REVOLT IN MANILA QUICKLY CRUSHED

### Ten Thousand Men Had Planned to Attack Four Points at the Capital.

### MOVEMENT POORLY ORGANIZED

Army and Police Officers Are Informed in Advance and Few Arrests and One Fight End the Affair.

MANILA, Dec. 26.—Eight Filipinos had been arrested on the charge of sedition as a result of an abortive uprising in Manila and its environs on Thursday night. Further arrests are probable.

From army sources it is learned that a general warning was sent to all officers on Thursday stating that fully 10,000 Filipinos in Manila alone were ready for a concerted attack on Fort Santiago, the Cuartel Espanol, the Cuartel Inferior and the Cuartel de San Juan. The military units were immediately prepared and a street patrol was started at dusk.

Constabulary agents, who are members of the secret societies, disclosed the plans for the uprising, thus enabling a force of constabulary and police to disperse gatherings at Basim Bayan, Pigo and Marikina near Marikina. A detachment of American sailors seized chairs when a force of Filipinos approached a dance hall in which they were gathered and, using the chairs as weapons, routed the Filipinos of whom quite a number were injured.

Revolt Lacks Leaders. The rising was evidently poorly organized and lacked leaders. It was composed for the most part of persons implicitly trusting the word of Artemio Ricarte, a revolutionary, who conducts a continual propaganda from Hong Kong, to which place he was banished by the American authorities some time ago. Ricarte, it is stated, advised that the anti-American attempt be made on Christmas eve, when the American officers would be expected to celebrate the holiday.

Reports from the provinces tell of minor risings and occasional violence, but details from these sections are lacking. The situation today, from all appearances, is well under control of the military.

Governor General Francis Burton Harrison appears to be away on an official visit and Winfred T. Denison, secretary of the interior, is in charge of affairs pending Mr. Harrison's return.

The Foreign Chamber of Commerce, supported by the Filipino body, has issued a public protest against the legislature's adoption of amendments to the internal revenue laws imposing additional taxes. The measure was introduced on the eve of the Christmas recess and was passed without discussion and also it is stated, without giving the merchants an opportunity to express their opinion regarding it. Representations from the Chamber of Commerce regarding the new law, it is announced, are to go today to Secretary of War Garrison, asking him to secure President Wilson's intervention in the matter.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—Officials of the insular bureau of the War department, in the absence of official advice today from Manila, inclined to the view that the reported rising there was not serious. Earlier in the week Governor General Harrison reported he could find no basis in Manila for accounts of a threatened revolt. Brigadier General Frank McIntyre, chief of the bureau of insular affairs, however, in view of renewed reports of trouble in the Philippine capital, called for a full report of the Christmas eve disturbances.

Officials said today there was at all times more or less disaffection among a restless element in the Philippines and that should the insular government be able to capitalize such disaffection. They profess not to believe anything like a rising of serious proportions is imminent in Manila or elsewhere through the islands.

Condition Exaggerated, Says Quezon. Manuel Quezon, resident commissioner from the Philippines in congress, declared today that conditions in the Philippines were being exaggerated by interests opposed to the pending bill for a greater measure of self-government and ultimate independence for the islands.

"I know nothing of the reported arrests for insurrectionist plots," he said. "I am satisfied that when investigated they will disclose nothing more serious than what has already been reported for violations of police regulations. The Philippine people know a revolutionary movement would interfere with independence. They will be much disappointed if the bill does not pass at this session of congress, but failure to pass it will not mean insurrection."

A cablegram received in the insular bureau from the Philippine government during the day concerned routine business, but made no reference to any disorders and did not contain anything, officials said, that could be construed as a reply to the message of inquiry in regard to the reported uprising.

## French Submarine Sunk by Austrians Near Pola Naval Base

PARIS, Dec. 26.—The Italian press states, according to advices to the Matin, that a French submarine belonging to the fleet of Vice Admiral Lapeyriere had been sunk while attempting to torpedo Austrian battleships in the Austrian naval base at Pola. The crew, it is stated, were rescued and taken prisoners.

## Year's Parcel Post Business Will Reach a Billion Packages

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—Preliminary estimates by postoffice officials place the number of parcel post packages handled during the Christmas rush at 100,000,000, and indicated that the total volume of parcel post traffic for 1914 will total nearly 1,000,000 packages.

## Eight Killed, 100 Hurt as Teuton Fliers Shell Russ City

PETERSBURG (Via London), Dec. 26.—Eight Germans were killed and over 100 wounded in the town of Sochaczew, Russian Poland, today by bombs thrown down from five German aeroplanes. One bomb dropped in the middle of a street which was watching the aviators

## FOGS INTERFERE WITH FIGHTING

### French Report Says Conditions of Atmosphere Prevents Operations in Flanders.

### FEW ARTILLERY EXCHANGES

German Attack at Chivry, in Alsace District, is Repulsed—French Make Progress in Upper Alsace.

PARIS, Dec. 26.—The official announcement given out by the French war office this afternoon relates that fogs in the north have interfered with the operations in Flanders. Counter attacks on the part of Germans have been repulsed at a number of points. There was artillery fighting near the sea and Perthes. Progress was made also in upper Alsace on Christmas day. The text of the communication follows.

"There has been moderate artillery exchanges on the front from the sea to the Lys. On the Lys itself, a heavy fog has made operations impossible. "Between the Lys and the Oise we have repulsed several counter attacks of the enemy, notably at Nouettes, to the west of Lens, at Boiselle, northeast of Albert, and at Lihons, to the west of Chaulnes, where a trench captured from the enemy was lost, and then recaptured by us after a spirited engagement.

German Attack at Chivry Repulsed. "Between the Oise and the Aisne, reports from this locality declare that during the day of December 24, a very strong German attack was repulsed at Chivry, to the northeast of Soupir. In the region of Perthes the artillery silenced the batteries of the enemy, which were bombarding the trenches recently occupied by our troops. Two strong German counter attacks were repulsed during the night of December 24-25.

"Yesterday, December 25, a further counter attack of particular severity, delivered on a front of 1,500 yards, with important bodies of troops, was completely checked.

"In the Aronne and between the Meuse and the Moselles there is nothing to report.

### Progress in Upper Alsace.

"In the upper Alsace, December 25 was marked by perceptible progress in front of Colmar. We reached the outskirts of the hills to the west of the town and here we held our positions in spite of several counter attacks. We occupy also the outskirts of Aspach, the valley and the heights which dominate Aspach on the west.

"In Flanders: The Germans, who succeeded in forcing their way across the Bours river, to the south of Sochaczew, were driven back after suffering heavy losses. The German attack on Bolnow resulted in failure. In the region of Inowjoda, on the Pilica river, and to the south of this locality, stubborn fighting continues. Along the entire course of the Nida river and to the south of the Vistula the fighting is going on under conditions favorable for the Russians."

## McAdoo to Represent Administration at San Diego Opening

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—To represent President Wilson at the opening of the exposition at San Diego, Cal., is the object of a trip today which Secretary McAdoo has arranged to take. The secretary was to be accompanied by Mrs. McAdoo, the president's youngest daughter.

One of the last official acts of the secretary before he leaves was the issuance of a statement in which all shippers who have been affected by high ocean freight rates and scarcity of vessels are called upon to send the facts to the Treasury of Commerce departments. The information is called for under a senate resolution directing the two departments to investigate the subject.

## Six Persons Burned to Death in Denver Apartment House

DENVER, Dec. 26.—Six persons were burned, some of them seriously, in a fire which gutted several rooms on the third floor of the Buckingham hotel, a fashionable apartment house early today. About fifty persons were driven from their apartments by the fire. The property damage was not heavy.

## Two Hagenbacks Killed in Battle

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Dec. 26.—Word that Lorenz and Henry Hagenback, the well known and famous owners of Germany, have been killed in battle, was received today by George Diekmann, president of the St. Louis Zoological society.

## FIRE CAUSES A HEAVY LOSS IN ARKANSAS TOWN

LAKE VILLAGE, Ark., Dec. 26.—Fire caused a loss estimated at \$5,000 today. Four of the largest buildings of the town were destroyed and thirteen firms and individuals suffered losses. The cause has not been learned.

## HOW TO USE A DOCTOR

The day is at hand when a physician regarded by the patient. Our hospitals can hold up his head and feel proud of his profession. The advanced guards are genuine, and they ring true every time.

"Medicine," says Dr. Victor C. Vaughan, the accomplished President of the American Medical Association, "consists of the application of scientific discovery to the prevention and cure of disease. All else which may go under the name of medicine is sham and fraud."

Says Dr. James Alexander Lindsay, F. R. C. P., Professor of Medicine in Queen's University of Belfast, President of the Section of Medicine of the Royal Academy of Ireland: "The public must learn that for disease to be countered successfully it must have early recognition and timely treatment. ## ONE KILLED AND ONE HURT WHEN AUTO TURNS TURTLE

PARKER, S. D., Dec. 26.—(Special Telegram.)—David Nowstrup, son of Lars Nowstrup, a wealthy farmer of this county, was killed yesterday afternoon, and Miss Ruth Gillen, a Spring Valley school teacher, was injured, when Nowstrup's automobile turned turtle on the road near here. Nowstrup and his companion were returning from Christmas mass at Marion when the accident occurred. Attention was called to the accident by the barking of dogs and when an investigation followed Nowstrup was found crushed under the car, dead, and Miss Gillen unconscious. She is expected to recover. Nowstrup was 28 years of age.

## Emperor of Austria Thanks American Children for Gifts

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—A dispatch to the Austro-Hungarian embassy from Vienna today announced that the Austrian emperor had expressed his thanks to President Wilson through Ambassador Penfield for the American Christmas gifts distributed yesterday among children of dead soldiers.

## Edgemont to Have Sanitarium

EDGEMONT, S. D., Dec. 26.—(Special.)—In the special election held in Edgemont Thursday, the franchise granting the exclusive use of the sulphur flow of the city well to William Bartlett and J. R. Calder was carried, by a vote of 58 to 7, the city council and Mayor Dale thus being sustained by an overwhelming majority. This means that work will be commenced on Edgemont's sanitarium at once.

## ACCUSES SILLIMAN OF TAKING BRIBE

Mexican Cabinet Minister Says He Accepted Money to Work for Release of Gen. Iturbide.

## CONSUL CALLS IT ABSURD

Governor of City of Mexico Who Kept Order During Iturbide Was Released on Request of Secretary Bryan.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—American Consul Silliman at Mexico City reported today that General Palafox, minister of agriculture in the cabinet of Provisional President Gutierrez, has issued a statement charging that he (Silliman) Special Agent Leon Canova and others had accepted a bribe of 500,000 pesos to effect the release of former Governor Iturbide.

Palafox, an adherent of Zapata, is said to have been eager to see Iturbide held. The latter was commander of the federal district during the brief administration of Provisional President Carranza, but remained after his colleagues had fled, and took an active part in keeping order after the Carranza forces withdrew and the Zapata forces entered.

Secretary Bryan, admiring Iturbide's personal courage, in preferring to maintain order in the city rather than make his own escape, took a personal interest in the case and identical representations were made to both Gutierrez and Villa to obtain his release. Iturbide now is on his way to the United States, but reports from Mexico City say Palafox announced his intention of arresting him if he were caught enroute to El Paso.

Mr. Silliman in his report, disclosed the story of the bribe as absurd.

## Gutierrez May Desert Villa

The Carranza agency here announced receipt of the following message from General Carranza's secretary at Vera Cruz:

"General Villareal at Monterey informs us that he recently had a conference at Saltillo with General Alvarez, the Gutierrez, governor of the state of San Luis Potosi, who informs him that Eulalio Gutierrez had sent him to inform Villareal that he had demanded from Villa that he eliminate himself from political activity, but that Villa had not complied and that Gutierrez was disposed to enroll himself and his troops once again under the banner of the first chief and the plan of Guadalupe."

## Maytorena Begins Retiring

NACO, Ariz., Dec. 26.—Governor Maytorena, with his Villa forces, began retiring today out of range of the guns of the Carranza garrison at Naco, Sonora. Official reports to Brigadier General Tasker H. Bliss, commanding United States forces here, show that the Villa forces have removed their machine guns, abandoned their front trenches and are preparing to retire to the main Maytorena camp, eleven kilometers from Naco.

## FOUR HUNDRED DIE AS TROOP TRAINS CRASH

LONDON, Dec. 26.—A Reuter dispatch from Warsaw says that 400 men were killed and 300 wounded in a collision between troop and hospital trains at Kallisz, Poland.

The troops were coming from Prussia and the hospital train was proceeding to Germany with wounded officers. The trains were running at full speed when they collided. More than twenty cars were wrecked.

An investigation disclosed that a railway switch had been changed at the last moment. The station master, switchmen and others are under arrest.
