DEMOS APPROPRIATE SEVEN AND ONE-HALF MILLIONS OF MONEY

Legislature Just Closed Comes Within Four Hundred Thousand of the Amount Given Two Years Ago.

FIGURES COMPILED BY PARTY

Specific Instances Do Not Show that House Kept Total Down to Noticeable Degree.

LINCOLN, April 14.—(Special.)—

Appropriations made by the session of the legislature just closed will come within about \$402,087 of the appropriations of the legislature of 1913, unless the governor should veto some of the bills which carry a money consideration.

Appropriations just made for the coming biennium show \$7,713,733. The 1913 session showed a total appropriation of \$8,115,820 by democratic figures.

Other figures place the appropriations a little more, but as some of the appropriations, notably the university maintenance fund, which includes the cash fund on tuition, has to be estimated, the difference comes only in the way the estimate is made. As democrats will have the publishing of the figures, it will probably be best to take the estimate from democratic sources. The two estimates do not differ greatly.


Germans Work on Rhine River Fortress

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WIRE COMPANIES HAVE BLACKLIST OF ALL UNIONISTS

Telegrapher Tells Industrial Commission Ban Placed on Members by Both Great Corporations.

LIST IS OPEN TO RAILROADS Many Men Driven from Country, While Others Use Aliases to Secure Work.

CARD REINSTATEMENT PRICE

CHICAGO, April 14.—C. H. McElrath, a telegrapher, employed by the International News service at Detroit, testified today before the United States Commission on Industrial Relations that the commercial telegraph companies maintain a blacklist.

"I am on it because I am a union man," he said, and added that he is sure the list is interchangeable between the Western Union and the Postal Telegraph companies.

Deliver from Country. "Many men have been driven from the country in this way," said the witness, "while others have obtained work by using an alias. These latter, however, are usually discovered in time."

"Do blacklisted men ever obtain reinstatement?" asked Frank P. Walsh, chairman of the commission.

"Yes, by surrendering his manhood—by surrendering his union card," replied McElrath.

They Didn't Know. "The men in San Francisco did walk out the day after the agreement was reached, but they did not know of the irrevocable nature of the agreement," said the witness.

BIG BATTLE IN HUNGARY HOLDS CENTER OF STAGE

Critical Importance of Series of Fierce Struggles in Carpathians Dwarfs Interest in the Other Fields.

EACH SIDE CLAIMS SUCCESS

Vienna Says Russians Checked, but Petrograd Insists Further Advances Are Made.

The Day's War News

RUSSIANS HAVE CAPTURED another section of the mountain range between Galicia and Hungary. This battle was an incident in a struggle of unusual severity now in progress along a front more than 100 miles from Brest, northern Hungary, to Kiev, eastern Galicia.

AUSTRIANS IN BUKOWINA and the Germans in northern Poland are making small movements, interpreted in Petrograd as intended to force the Russians to withdraw some of their troops from the Carpathians front.

OFFICIAL REPORT from Constantinople says the batteries at the entrance to the straits were bombarded yesterday and that a cruiser and destroyer were struck by the Turkish fire.

MESSAGES FROM VIENNA to Rome quote an Austrian official as saying that a state of siege probably will be proclaimed in Austria.

EMPEROR FRANCIS JOSEPH has decided to make the territorial concessions desired by Italy, provided that nation will take up arms for Austria and Germany.

BULLETIN. LEMBERG, April 13.—(Via Petrograd and London April 14.)—In a desperate attack by the Russians on the right flank of the Austrian position at Mesalborca, on the Hungarian side of the east Beskid mountains and about fifty miles south of Przemysl, the Austrians were forced after a twelve-hour battle to make a precipitate retreat.

LONDON, April 14.—The struggle for the last of the Carpathian passes remaining in the hands of the German allies still holds the center of the war stage.

The Austrian army that the Munich investors have been held in check since March 20, but an official statement from Petrograd declares that fighting is in progress more than fourteen miles to the south of Duela pass, which would indicate a considerable Russian advance in the direction of the Hungarian plains.

The Teutonic forces still hold Usok pass and continue their constant attacks, but last night the Russians announced the capture of three more heights within four or five miles of that vital gateway.

In the western arena, the allies have done little in the last two or three days beyond the consolidation of positions preparatory to another effort to oust the Germans from St. Mihiel.

Increased activity has been noted at the Dardanelles and rumors persist of German warships cruising in the northern waters of the North sea.
