Their condition was reported as critical.

German Aeroplane Attempts to Sink a Dutch Fishing Boat

LONDON, May 14.—A Reuter dispatch from Ymuiden says the Dutch trawler Sgravenhage reports that a taube aeroplane coming from the west, dropping three bombs on the fishing boat Wednesday, in spite of the fact that it was flying the Dutch flag. The bombs fell into the sea, where they exploded.

Kenyon Believes Kaiser Will Yield

FORT DODGE, Ia., May 14.—Senator W. S. Kenyon today told the Associated Press he believed President Wilson's demands in the note to Germany will be complied with. "The president's note is a clear presentation of our country's position, said the senator. "Germany, being a just nation, must recognize its force. I believe the president's demands will be complied with. He can be certain the nation is with him in whatever plan he deems best. He will never lead us to war if it can be honorably avoided."

Romance Brightens Lusitania Tragedy

LONDON, May 14.—A romance of the Lusitania developed yesterday, when Senator John Walsh and Miss Gertrude Nelson, a milliner, were married at Manchester, the home of the bridegroom. They met aboard the liner and became engaged. The bride fell from a lifeboat into the sea and was rescued by Walsh. Both were picked up by a trawler.

EMPLOYERS' LIABILITY WILL BE DUE TODAY

CHEYENNE, Wyo., May 14.—(Special.)—The first monthly remittances from employers of labor engaged in extra hazardous work due under Wyoming's new workmen's compensation act will be payable tomorrow. The Union Pacific Coal company will be the heaviest contributor, paying \$2,871.16, which represents 2 per cent of its monthly payroll. The company employs 2,174 miners.
