Gov. Johnson Kills Jit Bus License Bill. SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 14.—Measures licensing jit-bus fare automobiles, abolishing the practice of vivisection in California, and limiting to 12 per cent a year interest rates on money loans were among the 25 of a total of 97 bills passed by the recent legislature which Governor Johnson "pocket vetoed" by failing to sign by midnight last night, when the time limit for converting the bills into laws expired.

Russ Torpedo Boats Raze Turk Buildings. PETROGRAD, June 14.—(Via London.)—Russian torpedo boats on the night of June 10 destroyed the buildings of the Turkish depot of Samsun on the Black Sea, according to an official statement given out in Petrograd under date of June 12. Many Turkish boats, the announcement says, were sunk. The text of the statement reads: "On the night of June 10 our torpedo boats had an engagement with the German cruiser Breslau and caused it some damage. At Samsun our torpedo boats destroyed the buildings of the port and sank many of the enemy's boats."

Chief of Weather Bureau Comes Here. A distinguished stopover visitor, Charles F. Marvin, chief of the national weather bureau, is expected to arrive in Omaha Tuesday on his tour of inspection through the country. Prof. Marvin will be under the special protection of Local Forecaster Welsh while here.

TRY NEW WAY TO REACH LEMBERG

Begin Attack on San North of Przemysl and Along Dniester in Southeastern Galicia.

CLAIM TO HAVE MADE GAINS

LONDON, June 14.—Both in the Baltic provinces and along the Dniester river heavy fighting continues between the Russians and Austro-Germans, without, however, any very material change in the situation. The movement forward and backward of the battle lines in the Baltic provinces is almost continual, and each side has at various times held the advantage.

In Galicia the scene of the fighting has changed. The Germans, balked in their effort to reach Lemberg from the south, have commenced an attack upon the Russians on the river San, north of Przemysl, and along the Dniester in southeastern Galicia, and in their report tonight claim to have been successful in both sectors.

Near Roumanian Line. The movement southeast resembles that which failed further up the Dniester, at Zurewa, but is on a wider scale. The right wing of the Austro-German army is only twenty miles from the Roumanian frontier, while its left wing reaches as far as Halicz, where many attacks have been delivered against a bridgehead. The center of operations is Kolomea, from which point the main attacks which have carried the Teutonic allies across the Dniester in several places, are being launched.

Simultaneously the Germans are proceeding with their attack on the Russian center on the river Rawka, west of Warsaw, where they also have been successful, according to their report.

Artillery Battles in West. In the western war zone, artillery engagements are in progress from the sea to the Woevre, and even beyond that district, with here and there infantry fighting. The French have attempted to force the Germans at some points out of their strongly entrenched positions, and the Germans have been endeavoring to recover lost ground. A big German offensive was predicted several days ago, but so far it has not materialized, although it is still expected.

With Montefiore Gradica in their hands, the Italians have begun an attack on Gorizia (Gora), further up the Isonzo river, and one of the Austrians' most strongly fortified frontier positions. The Italians already have cut the communications to the north and south of the Gorizia, and it now depends entirely on the difficult mountain road to the eastward.

Luneville Bombarded. BERLIN, June 14.—German artillery yesterday bombarded the military works of Luneville, a French town fifteen miles southeast of Nancy, according to the official statement given out today by the German army headquarters.

German troops, the statement adds, stormed the town of Kurie, eight miles west of Shavil, in Kovno province, and took more than 5,000 Russian prisoners at Sienawa, in Galicia, and also captured the town of Mlyniska. The text of the statement reads: "In the western theater: 'Artillery duels took place at Nieuport and Dixmude, north of Arras, and at Liebuterne. Attempts of the enemy to make a night attack in the dunes were repulsed. Southeast of Liebuterne, infantry engagements are being fought. The military works around Luneville were bombarded. 'In the eastern theater: 'Our attack northwest of Shavil made good progress. Kurie was taken by storm. Enemy counter attacks failed. Eight officers and 2,300 men and eight machine guns were captured. 'Southwest of the Marnopol-Kovno road, battles against Russian reinforcements arriving from the south have commenced. 'North of Przasnyez 100 prisoners were taken. 'Our invasion into the enemy lines south of Bolimow was followed in the night by Russian counter attacks, all of which were unsuccessful. The gained positions are firmly in our hands. Our booty in this sector has been increased to 1,000 prisoners, eight cannon, two of which are of heavy caliber, and nine machine guns. 'In the southeastern theater: 'A bridgehead at Sienawa was recaptured yesterday. Our opponents left more than 5,000 prisoners in our hands. Counter attacks made by the enemy during the night failed. There has been a violent artillery engagement. In the afternoon we attacked the ridge to the north of the sugar refinery at Souchez, which was very powerfully organized by the enemy. This ridge was taken by assault and we have organized and maintained ourselves there, notwithstanding an intense bombardment.

"We attacked this morning to the southeast of Liebuterne the German trenches neighboring on the road from Serre to Mally Maillet. Our infantry carried by a single effort three of the enemy's lines and attained their object. They took more than 100 prisoners belonging to four different regiments, including the 170th.

"Prisoners declare that during the course of the fighting the last few days we have inflicted on the German troops very heavy losses. Certain units engaged in a counter attack were destroyed as soon as they formed.

Counter Attack Checked. "The enemy today attempted a counter attack which we immediately checked. Our artillery caused at Buleul, near Rhetims, a very heavy explosion. This was followed by a fire and a panic, which we accentuated by our fire.

"The Germans attempted to retake the trenches captured by us to the south of Quenneviers farm, east of Tracy-Mont, but they were completely repulsed and in following them up we made progress.

"Soldiers at the same time was bombarded, 130 shells being thrown into the town. On the rest of the front there is nothing to report.
