

Nebraska OFFICERS' SCHOOL KEEPS MEN BUSY

National Guardsmen Are Gaining Information Concerning the Conduct of War.

AVIATION CORPS IN TRAINING

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, June 22.—(Special.)—One hundred and fifty to 200 officers are in attendance at the camp of instruction of the Nebraska National Guard being held at the state fair grounds.

While rigid instructions have been issued to the officers to observe strict silence regarding any of the complications which are facing the government along war lines, still it can be seen that much interest in manifested and it is an open secret that most, if not all, of the officers of the Nebraska national guard are very busy with their studies. They are called into active service in Mexico or are called upon to defend the United States against the invasion of a foreign foe.

Officers Hard Worked.

Actual drill started yesterday at the camp and from now on the men will lead a strenuous life along the lines of military instruction. The idea that officers of the guard have a snap has long since disappeared and there are no harder worked men than the members of the guard who wear the khaki straps.

The camp is divided into three companies, A, B and C. Those composing company A are the men who have been longest in the service; those of B company those who are attending a camp of instruction for the first time, and C company is composed of the noncommissioned officers.

The first aeroplane flight will take place Wednesday afternoon. Captain Schaffer of the United States army aviation corps, and who was a classmate of Lincoln Beachey, was in charge of the school of aeroplane instruction, and will give all interested in sky flying a chance to learn the game.

While this school is for officers only the members of the guard will be assembled some time later, probably in two different camps, one of them in the western part of the state, or far enough west so that the western companies can participate without traveling too far.

Morehead Gets Office.

While Governor Morehead has been distributing offices around to a few lucky democrats one fell to the governor himself yesterday that he was not looking for—honorary vice president of the Richardson County club, composed of former residents of that county living in Lincoln. There are about 200 Richardson county people residing in the capital city, and an effort is being made to herd them into a club.

Find Property Not Taxed.

Another flock of sleeping cars which has heretofore escaped taxation has been dug up by Secretary Bernacker of the State Board of Assessment. The cars are operated by the Great Northern railroad, but the agent of the company claims that the Pullman company operates the cars as soon as they enter Nebraska and it was supposed the cars were included in the Pullman assessment. Colonel Tom Benton, representative of the Pullman company in Lincoln, will look the matter up.

Weeks Locates Water.

Chief Hydrographer D. P. Weeks of the state engineer's office returned this morning from the south and west part of the state, where he has been making measurements of water in the streams in that section of the country. He found no difficulty in locating plenty of water, and some other things not in his line of work.

One day while measuring the water in the Blue river at one point he counted fourteen hogs floating under the bridge making good time down stream, some of them still alive. The Blue river at Fairbury was so high that it was running over the tops of the fences and the Republican river was from one to four miles wide. In the vicinity of Culbertson corn has been listed three times.

Dairy Cows Infected.

Twenty-two dairy cows belonging to the Union College dairy were tested for tuberculosis last week and eleven of them reacted and were shipped to South Omaha for examination. Upon re-examination by the government officials five of the number were found in such bad shape that they were at once sent to the soap house. The others only showed slight indications and of such a nature that the meat can be used, as the disease only showed in portions of the body not used for domestic purposes.

State Veterinarian Anderson says that meat from cows showing only slight indications is absolutely safe for use, for if there were any chance that the meat had been infected cooking it would destroy the germs. There is really the most danger in using milk and butter from cows which have the disease, according to the doctor.

The American Express company has acknowledged the cost in the matter of paying the 2 per cent on its earnings in Nebraska, as called for by the Smith law, and today notified the state auditor that the amount due would be sent in forthwith. The tax amounts to something over \$9,000.

Injured by Firecracker.

(CALLAWAY, June 22.—(Special.)—The 7-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Art Hoffman was seriously injured Saturday evening when a large firecracker exploded, burning his face badly and seriously injuring his eyes.

BEATRICE, Neb., June 22.—(Special.)—The Board of Education held a meeting Monday evening and awarded the contract for constructing the addition to the West school to Butlerford & Conn of this city for \$10,000. The annual estimate for the coming year, which amounts to \$65,500, was adopted. Three new teachers—Miss Speller and Miss Foster of this city and Miss Winifred James of Kearney—were elected. The latter succeeds Miss Ruth Davis as physical director.

Mayor Adam McMullen of Wymore called for the resignation of City Marshal Lott, Monday. W. W. Chinook was appointed as Lott's successor.

George Segelke, a resident of Beatrice since 1888 and for the last twenty-five years proprietor of the pop factory in West Beatrice, died Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock at his home in this city after a prolonged illness aged 58 years. He is survived by his widow and three children, Ernest Stokeland, the 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Stokeland, who was struck by lightning last Thursday while enroute home from the field, died Saturday without regaining consciousness.

Superintendent Barr At Hastings Resigns

HASTINGS, Neb., June 22.—(Special Telegram.)—After six years' service C. M. Barr today tendered his resignation as superintendent of the Hastings schools. Mr. Barr came to the schools as principal of the high school and four years ago was made superintendent. He had two years yet to serve under contract made last year. He has given a progressive administration, but differences in the Board of Education as to policies caused friction which resulted in his withdrawal. He has made no plans for the future.

Daily Freight to Callaway.

(CALLAWAY, June 22.—(Special.)—It is stated upon good authority that a change will take place in the train service on the Kearney-Callaway branch in the near future. The passenger train and the motor car which have been running the last year will be removed, while a new motor car just turned out of the shops at Omaha will be installed. Instead of having a freight train every other day, as has been the last year, a daily freight service will be installed.

Nebraska Liquor Case Taken Into Supreme Court

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, June 22.—(Special.)—A question involving the authority of the city council of Omaha to restrict the number of wholesale liquor houses in that city has been brought to the supreme court in an appeal by the city from a decree of the Douglas county court which held that the council had not the right.

The Minneapolis Brewing company asked for a license to operate a wholesale liquor house at 1617 North Seventeenth street. The council, believing that the number should be restricted and that Omaha had all the wholesale houses of that kind needed, turned down the application. Drexel, Hummel, Jardine, Kugel and Withnell voting to restrict the number, while Butler voted no. The action was taken May 1, 1915.

The brewing company appealed to the district court, which refused to sustain the council, and the appeal by the city is the result.

ROCK ISLAND HARD HIT BY WASHOUTS

FAIRBURY, Neb., June 22.—(Special Telegram.)—Owing to washouts at Clyde and Scandia, train service on the Rock Island through Fairbury has been paralyzed and through trains are being detoured over the Union Pacific from Omaha. Thirteen thousand feet of track at Scandia is washed out.


