METERS AT SPRINKLING PLANTS

(From a Staff Correspondent.)
DES MOINES, July 2.—(Special Tele-
gram.)—An injunction was issued today
to prevent the Des Moines Water company
placing large water meters at all station-
ary sprinkling plants in the city used
for fire protection. The company some
time ago gave notice to business houses
that meters would be installed to measure
the water used in their fire protection
pipes and to prevent any use of water
for purposes other than stated.

Towns Should Govern Themselves.
