NEW MEDICAL DEAN AT CREIGHTON UNI

Dr. Robert Retzer of University of Chicago Appointed Head of Medical School Here.

SUCCEEDS DR. A. L. MUIRHEAD

Dr. Robert Retzer, recently of the faculty of the University of Chicago, has been appointed dean of the Creighton College of Medicine, succeeding Dr. A. L. Muirhead, who desired to be relieved of the details incident to the position in order that he might give himself up exclusively to teaching.


Dr. Muirhead will continue to head the department of physiology, which he has brought to such a high state of efficiency that it is one of the strongest parts of the medical course. His vast experience, his marked ability as a teacher, and his keen interest in his department, will combine, as in the past, to enlist the hearty support of the student body, and additional time, which will now be at his disposal, will enable him to work out plans long since formed but unexecuted, because of the attention claimed by the executive duties of the dean's office.

The new dean brings to his position an unusual amount of experience both as student and teacher. A graduate of the University of Leipzig, he taught for four years in the Johns Hopkins Medical school, two years in the medical department of the University of Minnesota, and four years at the University of Chicago. His specialty is anatomy, and at Creighton he will have charge of the anatomical laboratories, as well as the teaching of anatomy.
