Harry Grant Burned So Badly He Can't Run Next Saturday

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—Harry Grant, noted automobile driver and twice winner of the Vanderbilt cup race, was so badly burned today while contesting in the elimination trials for the Astor cup race at the Sheepshead bay track, that he will not be able to enter the contest next Saturday.

Grant's automobile caught fire while traveling at a 100-mile an hour clip and Grant and his mechanic were enveloped in flames.

They brought the machine to a stop and jumped out, but Grant was burned severely on the legs and arms and was taken to a hospital.
