

STATE BANK BUYS THE CITY NATIONAL

State Bank of Omaha Takes Over Deposits and City National Ceases to Exist.

IN NEW LOCATION ON MONDAY

The State Bank of Omaha has taken over the deposits of the City National bank and has also bought the furniture and fixtures and will move into its new location ready for business Monday.

All of the depositors of the State Bank of Omaha are protected by the depositors' guarantee fund of the state of Nebraska, and the former depositors of the City National are now protected by the same fund.

None of the officers or stockholders of the City National will be in any way connected with the State Bank of Omaha, and the officers and directors of the State bank will remain as they are.

The State bank of Omaha, of which A. L. Schantz is president, has been organized for three years, and during that time it has increased its deposits to over \$1,500,000. It has outgrown its present quarters, hence the new deal, which will give the State bank deposits of over \$1,500,000.

The City National will cease to do business as a bank and the affairs of the bank will be formally closed by its officers.

Pensions for the English Soldiers Are to Be Increased

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) LONDON, Sept. 29.—Higher pensions for disabled officers of the army and navy and for their widows, orphans and dependents have been proposed by a parliamentary committee of which Bonar Law is chairman. But even this falls far below the scale granted in the United States.

Subalterns would receive under the new arrangement \$300 a year when completely disabled, with an additional \$20 for each year of service in excess of fifteen years up to a maximum of \$1,350. An officer of rank corresponding to major in the army would get a minimum of \$965 if partially disabled, and \$1,000 if totally disabled. For lieutenant colonels and navy commanders the minimum for partial disablement is put at \$1,000 and an addition of \$250 to their ordinary pensions if entirely disabled.

The widows and dependents of subalterns have a graduated scale proposed for them, with \$500 a year in the case of the officer is killed in action, and if he dies of disease contracted on active service and \$250 in the case of other injuries or disease.

It is proposed in addition to make educational grants in special cases for the education of officers' children.

Huge Sums Spent For French Supplies

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) PARIS, Oct. 6.—France's growing effort to accumulate artillery and ammunition is shown in an analysis of war expenditures.

The total for fourteen months shows over 1,000,000,000 francs (\$300,000,000) spent for cannon and ammunition, at the rate of 100 millions a month in 1914, 225 millions a month during the first half of 1915 and 370 millions a month during the quarter ending September 30.

The expenditures for artillery and ammunition are exceeded only by the item of food and forage, which amounted to 1,200,000,000 francs. Next in order comes the clothing and quartering of the troops, about 1,200,000,000, and the pay of the troops, about 1,000,000,000.

Vehicles, including automobiles, were bought to the amount of 220,000,000 francs, and 1,500,000,000 was paid for horses and mules.

The sanitary department has cost 67,000,000 to date, an average of 35,000,000 a month during 1914 and 30,000,000 a month in 1915.

The total expenditure for distinctly military operations from July 21, 1914, to September 30, 1915, is about 18,000,000,000 francs, making up 75 per cent of the budget during that period.

A billion and a half has been spent for the relief of the soldiers' families and workers thrown out of employment, while 200,000,000 have been spent for the feeding and sheltering of refugees.

The subscriptions to the National Defense bonds and obligations have furnished 66 per cent of the funds for the total expenditures of 27,000,000,000 francs during the fourteen months ending September 30, the established rates have produced 16 per cent, and the remainder 18 per cent has been advanced by the Bank of France.

STAR-GAZING CUSTOMARY IN LONDON SINCE AIR RAIDS

LONDON, Oct. 5.—Since Eppelstein raids have become more the rule than the exception in London and environs, there has been a marked increase in public interest in astronomy. Just now the newspapers are filled with discussions about this or that star—discussions directly attributed to the habit of star-gazing in the hope of sighting hostile air craft. Toward 11 o'clock at night, the usual "tear time," perhaps a third of London looks skyward.

A few nights after the big raid the planet Jupiter, seemingly rising in an unobscured place, was mistaken for a Zeppelin straggler. Perhaps a dozen persons made the discovery. Since then several newspaper articles have appeared giving Jupiter a clean bill of health.

BOYS IN GREAT CIVIL WAR

More Than Two Million Soldiers in Union Army Were Lads Under Twenty-One Years.

CHILDREN WIN THE BATTLES

The soldier-boy legend is one of those myths that die hard or that do not die at all. Facts do not kill the fairy tale that the American civil war was fought by boys. When a fable gets a good start, and if it is a romantic fable which makes a strong appeal to a man's fancy or imagination, it is almost a self-started, and it is a difficult thing—sometimes an impossible thing—to stop. Hard, cold facts will not run fast enough or far enough to catch up with a popular legend.

It seems an affectionate and patriotic expression to call our soldiers, or soldier men "soldier boys." Of course, a soldier, no matter if he has a gray beard and a bald head, is a boy to his parents. In the eyes of parents, especially of the mother, it is a most unusual thing for a boy to outgrow his boyhood. He is always mother's boy.

A recent newspaper writer, treating of the subject, "Boys in the War," wrote: "For the truth is, battles are lost and won by children. Our own war between the states may be taken as typical. In that struggle there were 2,700,000 enlistments in the union army. Of this number more than 1,000,000 were under 21 years of age—or, to be exact, 2,199,728. If you have a lad of 17 about the house you consider him a child, of course; that is all he is. Yet we had more than 800,000 of these children in our war between the states, more than 100,000 of them being under 15 years of age, and they determined the result of the struggle. It was that 15,000 men of 16 years of age, or so, nor the 45,000 between 15 and 16 that found their way into the service. There were more than a thousand children under 12 years of age in the civil war and 200 of them were under 12. Twenty-five little fellows of 10 years of age were enlisted, but they were drummer boys and were usually in the service with their fathers."

These figures have been going the rounds for a long number of years. It is not clear where they originated, but about forty-five years ago the adjutant general's department of the United States army issued a report in which the statement was made that the average age of the men engaged in the civil war on the union side was 23 years. As to their being more than 2,000,000 under 21 years of age, it is probable that not that many were enlisted in the union armies. There were 2,700,000 "enlistments," but a great many of these were re-enlistments, and the number of bounty jumpers, or men who enlisted, deserted and again enlisted under another name, and repeated this proceeding until caught or finally discharged or killed, will never be known. But the re-enlistments and the existing repeaters cut down very considerably under 2,700,000 the number of men under service in the federal armies.

The boy myth does not stand the photographic test. Thousands of photographs were made of union soldiers during the civil war. There were photographs of individual soldiers, groups, squads, companies and regiments. Youth, bearded youth, was there, but tender boyhood and immature lads are not to be seen in many of the pictures.

In the armies of the south, especially in the later phases of the conflict, many 15 and 16-year-old boys were in the ranks. The reason was that the confederacy raked the south for white males able to bear arms.

CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL USED FOR FRENCH SOLDIERS

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) ZUYDCOOTE, France, Oct. 6.—In this coast town there is one of the largest military hospitals in France. Founded in 1898 as a hospital for deformed and tuberculous children, it has one feature overlooking the foresight of its founders.

Although intended solely for children, all the beds, baths and operating tables were constructed full length. In case there should be a war, now every one of the nearly 2,000 beds contains a wounded French soldier. This hospital, by the way, bears on its front walls the marks of a bomb dropped by a Taube.

The bricks were cracked and the glass in several windows broken, a bomb having fallen about ten feet in front of the structure. There is no other building within a quarter of a mile.
