Before the onlookers could recover from their surprise the Nebraska was on top with his two legs clamping Husane's torso. In five minutes and four seconds Smith, aged 35, slapped Stecher's shoulder and Young Husane's the Nebraska wrestler's bustle, was a second-rater.

Albert Hastings and J. W. Jackman of Silver Creek timed the falls. "He's the greatest wrestler in the world," exclaimed Referee Smith to Husane as the latter limped to his corner and dozes a robe.

"So do I," absently answered the Bulgarian. "He was toff guy."

Gene Melady, promoter of the affair, was satisfied with the outcome, even though the 4,000 attendance was not up to his expectations.

"Omaha would have brought out twice as many," he said. "However, I have no regrets on that score. I am glad to have the opportunity to again show Joe Stecher up for the clean, honest, wholesome athlete that he is."

Of the 14,000 persons who paid admission to see the big match between the wrestling premiers, perhaps nearly 1,000 were from Omaha. One special train of twelve coaches, hauled by two Burlington engines, and carrying over 1,000 wrestling fans were led into the stadium by Dan Gaines of the Merchants hotel. Gaines organized the Omaha contingent faithfully, and when they moved into the big stadium, the others already there burst into a welcoming cheer. Earlier trains from Omaha were crowded to capacity, and hundreds of others went in automobiles in spite of the cold weather.

Only one preliminary match was offered, which was a relief to the crowd at that, since everyone appeared to be keyed up to nothing but a headliner match. Fred Moorhead of Cortland and Chris Jordan of Fried, Neb., tussled for twenty minutes to a draw, neither showing anything sensational, but doing enough to kill a little time, and whet their appetites. appropriated by the congress for supplemental estimates and deficiencies for the fiscal year 1916, a total of \$12,000,000.00.

"Surplus for fiscal year 1916 (assuming that emergency taxes and sugar duties are continued), \$101,644,605.75.

"Panama canal payments for 1916 are estimated at \$20,000,000. These, under existing law, may be paid by sale of bonds. It paid, however, out of current revenues, we must deduct \$20,000,000.

"On this basis, available balance at end of fiscal year 1916, would be \$76,644,605.75.

"Now let us consider the fiscal year 1917, which we begin with a balance in the treasury of \$76,644,605.75.

"Total estimated receipts, on the assumption that present emergency revenue taxes and duties on raw sugar are continued, \$130,000,000.

"Total for 1917, \$207,144,605.75.

Estimated Disbursements.

"Total estimated disbursements, including \$20,000,000 new or additional expenditures for greater national defense or preparedness and excluding Panama canal payments, \$125,961,342.22.

"Deficiency, 1917, \$25,500,963.22.

"Estimated deficiencies and supplemental appropriations for 1917, \$120,000,000.

"Add for working balance in treasury to begin fiscal year 1915, \$20,000,000.

"Panama Canal payments for 1917 are estimated at \$20,000,000.

"If paid out of revenue and not from sale of bonds, adds \$20,000,000.

"On this basis the total new revenue to be raised for fiscal year 1917 is \$112,500,000.

"If, however, the Panama canal payments for the years 1916 and 1917, amounting to a total of \$40,000,000, should be paid from the proceeds of bond sales, then the amount of additional revenue which must be raised for the fiscal year 1917 is estimated to be \$102,500,000. It would not be an unusual thing to finance the Panama canal payments by the sale of government bonds; in fact, \$138,000,000.00 of Panama canal payments have been met by the sale of such bonds as follows:

Series of 1900.

Series of 1904, administration of President Roosevelt, 2 per cent, principal of bonds, \$4,501,900; premium received, \$1,948,000.

Series of 1905, administration of President Roosevelt, 2 per cent, principal on bonds, \$20,000,000; premium received, \$7,128,000.

Series of 1911, administration of President Taft, 3 per cent, principal on bonds, \$20,000,000; premium received, \$1,293,741.10.

Total principal of bonds, \$134,521,900; total premium received, \$12,969,741.10.

Total realized, \$128,000,000.

"Under the present administration all payments for the Panama canal have been made out of current revenues, amounting since March 4, 1915, to date, to \$27,000,000. There is no necessity in my opinion for the issuance of bonds, notwithstanding the continuance of the European war and its inevitable effects upon the revenues.

What He Prefers.

"I believe that it would be far preferable to continue to pay the expenditures for the Panama canal out of current revenues, especially since the canal is almost completed and it is likely that the demands upon the treasury from that source will largely decrease in the near future. If the policy is adopted of providing sufficient revenues to cover the Panama canal payments as well as all other demands on the treasury, it will probably be broad enough to take care of any ordinary fluctuations in the revenues and expenditures of the government in the future.

"Therefore, if bonds are not issued for Panama canal payments, the total amount of new revenue required for the fiscal year 1917 (assuming, as before stated, that the present duty on sugar

and the present emergency revenue taxes are continued) is \$12,800,963.22, in which is included the sum of \$20,000,000 for preparedness or new measures for the national defense. This amount can easily be raised by the internal taxation without appreciable burdens upon the American people.

Resources So Great.

"The resources and wealth of the country are so great and are increasing so rapidly that the needs of the government for its normally growing expenditures and for the carrying out of the larger program for national defense can readily be met. Merely as suggestions I would say that consideration may well be given to increasing the rates of taxation on individual and corporate incomes and of reducing the exemption under the present law of \$3,000 for single and \$4,000 for married persons to \$2,000 and \$3,000 respectively. The surtax could begin at \$10,000 or \$15,000 instead of \$20,000, as provided at present.

"In addition to any increases that may be made in the corporation and individual income taxes a tax could be imposed on such products as gasoline, crude oil and refined oils, horse power of automobiles and other internal combustion engines, and various other articles not necessary to mention. These taxes would be widely diffused and scarcely felt. Certainly the nation is willing when it is so able to do so, to raise by taxation the amount needed for such a vital purpose as national preparedness and defense.

"It is, of course, the function of the congress to determine what revenue shall be raised and how, and these views must not be considered as a program but merely as suggestions for discussion."

CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—An increase of 24 per cent in the number of places found for unemployed in October, 1915, as compared with the same month a year ago, was noted in a statement issued today by Charles J. Boyd, general superintendent of the Illinois Free Employment office.

The statement reviewed the work of the office from its reopening, August 1, through November 22. In this period Mr. Boyd said 4,787 places were found for the 29,500 persons who applied for work.

Judge Whose Wife Killed in Quarrel Put Under Arrest

MORRILLTON, Ark., Nov. 25.—A warrant charge of assault with intent to kill has been issued for Eugene Rhoden, county judge, who was shot by T. J. Kiasire, Rhoden's father-in-law, following the alleged killing yesterday of Mrs. Rhoden by Mr. Kiasire. Judge Rhoden now is in a hospital in Little Rock.

In a quarrel between Judge Rhoden and his wife, who was at her father's home, Judge Rhoden attempted to strike Mrs. Rhoden, it is charged. Kiasire, attempting to shoot Judge Rhoden, killed Mrs. Rhoden. A second shot from Kiasire's shotgun shattered Rhoden's left arm.

Before a coroner's jury Kiasire testified that he attempted to kill Judge Rhoden "in defense of his home," and that the killing of Mrs. Rhoden was accidental. Kiasire was exonerated by the coroner's jury, following which the warrant for Judge Rhoden was issued. Mrs. Rhoden, in addition to her husband, leaves three children.

Man, Wife, Daughter and Son Drowned in Lake at Cody, Wyo.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Nov. 25.—Alex McCou, aged 64, his wife, 11-year-old son and 8-year-old daughter were drowned in a lake near their ranch home last Sunday, according to a message from Cody, Wyo., today. The drowning was witnessed by three other children, aged 7, 4 and 3 years. None of the surviving children could give a coherent story of the accident, saying their mother and elder brother broke through the ice.

The 4-year-old child attempted to telephone to a neighbor and was unable to make himself understood. When recovered the bodies of Mr. and Mrs. McCou were clasped in each other's arms.

PROMINENT KENTUCKY MINISTER UNFROCKED

LEXINGTON, Ky., Nov. 25.—Upon his conviction by twelve members of his own conference upon charges of indiscretions, Rev. B. F. Chatham, a prominent minister of central Kentucky, was today expelled from the Kentucky Methodist conference and ministry. It was charged that Chatham had been guilty of indiscretions with a prominent woman of Middleboro, Ky., but he denied his guilt. Chatham was suspended last September when the charges were first filed.
