POLLARD ON REFERENDUM

Believes the Law Good, in that It Removes from Politics Questions of Moral Nature.

TO MEET HERE WITH FARMERS

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Nov. 23.—(Special.)—E. M. Pollard of Nebraska is very well satisfied with the recognition the people are giving his candidacy for the republican nomination for governor.

Mr. Pollard was in Lincoln last night and left today for his home in Cass county, and this week will attend the meeting of the National Farmers' congress, which will be held in Omaha, where he will take an active part in the session.

"I was very well pleased with the result of my trip," said Mr. Pollard. "I visited Grand Island, Red Cloud and several other points and find that my candidacy is looked upon very favorably, especially by the business men in those towns. They appear to like the stand I have taken on the questions which the voters will have a chance to vote upon at the next election. Notwithstanding my own opinion that the initiative and referendum law was passed by the legislature one of the strong points made by those who desired its enactment into law was that it would take questions like those of a moral nature out of politics. It would give the people of the state a chance to pass upon them solely upon their merits and give them a chance to vote for men upon their fitness as future lawmakers or officials, without these questions influencing the vote. At the time the law was passed in the 1911 session the law covered this very proposition.

"All propositions submitted in pursuance hereof shall be submitted in a non-partisan manner and without any indication or suggestion on the ballot that they have been approved or endorsed by any political party or organization." The act of itself shows that it was passed with the idea that the submission of any proposition to the people should stand on its own merits and that the voter should not be influenced in any way by any other thing. It was passed with the idea that it would relieve the candidate from having to bother with any question which the people themselves were deciding by their votes and was simply an effort to get results direct from the people, leaving the candidates themselves to stand entirely upon their fitness for the office they were aspiring to be elected to.

Dem Parsimony Hampers Guard By Lack of Cash

LINCOLN, Nov. 23.—(Special.)—The unbusinesslike and parsimonious action of the last state legislature in crippling institutions of the state by a refusal to appropriate sufficient funds to carry on the work of those departments of the government is evidenced occasionally already and the biennium is not half gone.

It was discovered last week that two departments had drawn warrants for about \$40,000 in advance on a fund that would have lapsed if this action had not been taken.



CANADA SEIZES WHEAT AND WILL DECIDE ON PRICE

While the holders of grain in store are entitled to fair treatment, it has been thought desirable not to precipitate market conditions at the expense of the consumers from whom we hope to obtain orders in the future and who are our allies in the war.

The action taken by the British government is based entirely on war conditions and the response of the Canadian government has been dictated by with regard to the same state of facts.

Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 23.—News of the embargo on export of Canadian wheat created a sensation in grain exchange and transportation circles. General opinion is the order will prevent any shipments in bond or otherwise of Canadian wheat into the United States either by rail or lake ports.

A meeting was held of the Winnipeg Grain exchange to consider whether the exchange shall open the market for wheat tomorrow.

Local grain men did not know last night just what the effect of the seizure would be as they said that it would depend largely upon what price was fixed by the British government. They said, however, that they thought it would have a bearish effect on the local market.

"Great Britain, which realizes the enormous crop we have may be trying to cheapen our crop," said one leading wheat operator. "If the government steps in and decides to handle the wheat crop it cuts out the middle men who are always striving to keep up the price. If the British government makes the price low, it will have a tendency to drive down the price the farmers of the United States will receive."

"Just what the effect will be cannot be foretold until more details are available. This wheat must have all been intended for export anyhow."
