Webber declared that he was beating his way back to New York from the western coast and that he was pressed into service as a highwayman by Holmes, who threatened to kill him if he ever told of the crime.

BEATRICE, Neb., Dec. 4.—(Special.)—Fire of unknown origin Friday afternoon destroyed the farm home of George Shafer, three miles southeast of Beatrice.
