Strike of Arizona Copper Miners Over

CLIFTON, ARIZ., Jan. 25.—The strike of 5,000 miners in the three copper districts of Clifton, Morenci and Metcalf, Ariz., which began September 11, last, was definitely terminated tonight, when the former employees of the three operating concerns, the Arizona, Detroit and Shannon Copper companies, voted unanimously to return to work under the proposition offered by the managers of the three companies on January 8. Operations, suspended since the strike began, probably will be resumed next week.

Can't Enter Mexico Without Fifty Bucks

GALVESTON, Tex., Jan. 25.—The Mexican consulate here was notified today that General Carranza had promulgated a decree which would require all persons entering Mexico to have at least \$50 in their possession. This will apply to all foreigners entering the country by boat or along the American border, says the dispatch.
