

WOODMEN BANQUET IS A HAPPY AFFAIR

Four Hundred Members of Two Camps Hear Fine Tributes Paid to Their Order.

MAYOR AND GOVERNOR THERE

Almost 400 members of Commercial and Seymour camps of the Woodmen of the World held their second annual joint complimentary banquet at Hotel Fontenelle Tuesday night.

Tells Funny Stories.

In the course of a funny talk, Mayor Dahlman declared he had never had so much fun in his life before. He told a number of stories, including one concerning the pulchritude of Sovereign Commander Fraser.

True fraternalism of humanity, and man's natural love of home, were emphasized by Rev. Mr. Buxton, who declared them to be exemplified in woodcraft.

Governor Morehead speaks in favor of spending money for the education and protection of the youth of the nation, rather than the establishment and maintenance of a great standing army.

Commander Fraser and Auditor Wells also spoke disparagingly of war preparedness and asserted that true patriotism lies in brotherhood and protection of the home, such as woodcraft provides.

Both officials of the order declared that it had done a great deal for Omaha and Nebraska, that it is for Omaha first, last and all the time, and they felt that Omahans and Nebraskans are loyal friends of the order.

Commander Fraser paid a tribute to Mayor Dahlman, whom he called "Honorable Jim Dahlman, the greatest mayor Omaha ever had," and whom even his bitterest enemies could not accuse of dishonesty.

"Patriotism was Carl E. Herring's subject. He contemplated what the United States must be and do, after the European war.

CAUSE OF MEN'S INJURIES NOT DISCLOSED BY THEM

Police are trying to solve the mystery surrounding the minor injuries of a Tom Murphy, said to be a guest at the Bayou hotel, and a Pat Barry, who says he came from Creston, Ia., yesterday.

ONLY ONE WILL GRADUATE FROM UNIVERSITY OF OMAHA

Only one student will graduate from the University of Omaha this term. This honor falls to Miss Ruth Peters, who entered the local college last year from Drury university. Miss Peters plans to teach schools the following semester.

RUNS SALOON IN A DRY STATE; SNOW PROTECTS

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 26.—Reports were brought to District Attorney Samuel W. Johnson of the First judicial district court today, that a saloon is being operated at Ballinger, Colo., a lumber camp in the mountains, in violation of the new prohibition law, effective January 1, last.

The snow is said to be so deep that it may be some time before the authorities can reach the place. It was not definitely known in the camp, it was said, that the state had gone dry.

BOMBS OF ALLIED FLYERS CAUSE DEATHS OF HUNDRED

LONDON, Jan. 26.—Allied airmen have again dropped bombs on Monastir and Giugliani and 30 persons are estimated to have been killed or wounded in the latter town. The Germans, on their part, have dropped explosives from aircraft on Dunkirk, where five persons were killed, and on the Aerodrome at Nancy and factories in Baccarat.

With Three Children Ill with Scarlet Fever Mrs. Mary Nitzel Left Without Bit of Coal.

ASSOCIATED CHARITIES HELPS

During Tuesday night a thief broke into the coalshed of Mrs. Mary Nitzel, 4216 North Fortieth street, and stole all the fuel this poor woman had. She is nursing three children who have scarlet fever, one being in a serious state, and she has two other children at home.

Mrs. Nitzel told Health Inspector Morarty that she does not know where her husband and 10-year-old son are, the former having left home two months ago. She owes a month and a half rent and has barely enough food to last twenty-four hours when the health official called.

Secretary Doane of the Associated Charities was notified and she at once ordered a ton of coal and provisions, with directions to rush deliveries.

The Associated Charities are assisting twelve families who have become destitute during the scarlet fever epidemic.

ROW BETWEEN SWEDEN AND BRITAIN UNSETTLED

LONDON, Jan. 26.—The controversy between Great Britain and Sweden over the holding up of mails by Great Britain and Russian mail and the placing of an embargo on wood pulp by Sweden is still unsettled, but negotiations are under way for mutual concessions.

Although nothing official has yet transpired, it is believed that licenses for the exportation of wood pulp from Sweden will be granted in exchange for permission to import coal from England.

Colonel Welsh Promises to Get Reliable Groundhog for Omaha

Next Wednesday is ground hog day. The near approach of this first harbinger of the gentle springtide is of such importance that we decided to interview Colonel Lucius Altitudinous Welch of the weather bureau.

Colonel Welch received us courteously. He looked up from the map where he was juggling with the weather to answer our question.

"I have taken steps," he said solemnly as befitting the great subject, "to secure a wise old ground hog, one that we can rely on. Omaha deserves the best there is and an office so important as this one cannot be complete without a thoroughbred groundhog so that we can know with certainty whether the winter is over or whether we are still to have six weeks more."

The colonel politely declined to state where he will get the animal, but he emphasized the fact that he's not going to get some cheap, second-hand ground hog that couldn't tell his shadow from a hole in the ground.

TEUTONS AND AIDES AT THE WHITE HOUSE

President and Mrs. Wilson Give Second Diplomatic Reception of the Year.

BULGAR MINISTER IS ABSENT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—President and Mrs. Wilson gave their second diplomatic dinner at the White House tonight with the representatives of Germany and its allies and the neutral nations present.

Count von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, the ranking diplomat present tonight, occupied a seat near to Mrs. Wilson. Austria-Hun-

gary and Turkey were represented by charges d'affaires in the absence of ministers. The Bulgarian minister, Stephen Panaretoff, is in mourning for a son killed in the war and did not attend. All of the neutral representatives were present except the ministers from Costa Rica, the Dominican republic, Ecuador, Honduras and Peru.

He declared congress was sufficiently informed to act and charged the administration with seeking to postpone responsibility for action.

CONFIRM STORY OF AMERICANS SLAIN

Three from Chihuahua City Verify Report of Murder of Five from This Country.

VILLA IS DEFINITELY LOCATED

EL PASO, Tex., Jan. 26.—Three Americans, who arrived today from Chihuahua City, confirmed previous reports of the murder by Mexican bandits of five Americans between December 22 and January 9, last. These were given as Henry Acklin, a rancher living south of Minaca; his son-in-law, Wallace Matburn; Tom Johnson, a ranch hand; Peter Keane, bookkeeper for the Babricora ranch of William R. Hurst, and Bart Kramer, son of David Kramer, one of the Americans driven out of western Chihuahua last December.

Francisco Villa, with a force estimated at 1,000 men, has been located, according to advices from the south, in Santa Clara canyon, on the Santa Clara ranch of the Texasas family, about forty-five miles of Chihuahua City.


