

MAYORS TO TALK OVER WILSON PLAN

Meeting Called in St. Louis in March to Make Plans for Action.

DAHLMAN TO SUPPORT PLAN

John Purroy Mitchell, Henry W. Kiel and J. C. Dahlman, mayors of New York, St. Louis and Omaha, respectively, will issue a call for a meeting of mayors of the country, to meet in St. Louis on March 3 and 4 for discussion of the president's preparedness program and to take such action as will impress congress with the need for prompt action.

Mayor Mitchell sent Mayor Dahlman a telegram on the subject, asking co-operation in issuing this call. The mayor of this city will wire his willingness to join in this effort and expects to attend the conference and participate in the deliberations.

Mayor Dahlman is in sympathy with the president's program and will do all he can to support the plan.

The telegram from Mayor Mitchell reads as follows: Will you join with Hon. Henry W. Kiel, mayor of St. Louis, and myself, in issuing a call for a conference of the mayors of the country on national defense, together with such committees as you have appointed on defense, to be held in St. Louis on March 3 and 4. The subject of national defense is most vital, and it is planned to make this conference thoroughly representative in the hope that congress may be impressed with the demand from all parts of the country for prompt action. Kindly wire me your acceptance.

Union Men Give an Hour's Wage to Help Pay Hatters' Fine

More than 4,000 members of Omaha trade unions contributed an hour's wage toward payment of the \$300,000 fine of the Danbury (Conn.) Hatters' union, in celebration of the sixty-sixth birthday of Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, according to estimates made by the union. Most of the Omaha union men who are employed are believed to have contributed, but no estimate of the amount given can be made until reports are made by the local unions to the central organization, according to T. W. McCullough, delegate of the International Typographical union to the American Federation of Labor.

The painters and stereotypers and electrotypers, No. 24, made their contributions a week ago. They were sent to Secretary Morrison of the American Federation of Labor and Martin Lawlor, secretary of the United Hatters of North America.

Local unionists took the occasion much as a matter of course. Contributions were entirely voluntary. In many shops the names of those who had given their portions were posted.

The money will go to pay the fine and court costs imposed against the Hatters' union of Danbury, Conn., in the famous case brought under the Sherman anti-trust law by Loeve & Co.

Here is a Chance to Help Anti-Spitting Campaign in Omaha

Mrs. H. C. Sumney, who is backing a campaign for the observance of the anti-spitting ordinance, estimates that the cost of printing cards and billboard posters will be about \$150, and she makes a public appeal for contributions toward this fund. Working with Mrs. Sumney is Mrs. K. J. Edholm, representing the Nebraska Society for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis.

B. A. Wilcox of the Omaha National bank has agreed to serve as treasurer and will receive and account for all contributions sent. Those interested may send their money by mail or call on Mr. Wilcox.

"This is the people's fight and we are confident that the money will be well spent," said Mrs. Sumney.

Next week 500 placards will be distributed among various centers of industry, the text of these notices calling attention to the evils of spitting in public places. It has been estimated that legislation against spitting has not been very effective. The present campaign will be one of agitation and education.

Passengers Tell of Fourteen Feet of Snow in the West

Passengers coming through from the Pacific coast bring with them the prize snow stories relative to the recent snow blockade on the Southern Pacific that tied up trains for several days in the mountains of Nevada. At Summit, Cal., west of Reno, the snow fell to a depth of fourteen feet on the level. At Reno there was a snowfall of twelve feet. There were several trains stalled at Reno until the rotary plows bored holes through the drifts. There was no drifting, but without it, in the town of Reno, passengers tunneled from the train to the town, a couple of blocks. Along the streets there were tunnels and cross tunnels, extending from one business house to another. Provisions were plentiful and there was an abundance of fuel, so that there was no suffering.

Wheat Touches the High Mark for Year

Wheat on the Omaha market made another gain in price, going up 1/4 to 2 cents per bushel and touching the high mark of the year. Spring wheat sold at \$1.28 to \$1.31, and the hard variety at \$1.16 to \$1.23, the price depending upon the quality. The receipts were fifty-three carloads.

Corn was up one-half to 3/4 cents per bushel, selling all the way between 68 and 71 cents per bushel. The receipts were seventy-two carloads.

Oats were strong and one-fourth to one-half cent up, selling at 47 1/2 to 50 cents per bushel. There were nineteen carloads on the market.
