NEWSPAPER LAW OF OREGON.—Section 2222 of the laws of Oregon provides that whenever any person circulating a newspaper shall mail such newspaper to any person in this State without first receiving an order therefor, such newspaper shall be deemed to be a gift, and no debt or obligation shall accrue against such person, whether said newspaper is received by the person to whom it is sent or not.

Among the many public improvements now being made in Eugene is the rebuilding of the Pacific States Telephone Company's system at the cost of \$20,000. The wires will all be laid underground. A large force is now digging trenches for conduits for the wires.

Alderman William C. Herbert is advocating an ordinance before the Jersey City Board of Aldermen providing that a license fee of \$1 a year be charged for cats, that they be tagged and unlicensed cats be collected the same as dogs. The ordinance was laid over for 90 days, when it will come up for final reading.

United States Senator Charles W. Fulton has written a letter to H. W. Cake, who defeated Fulton for the Senatorial nomination last week, in which the Senator extends his congratulations to his successful opponent and assures him of such support as the Senator can give. In conclusion, Senator Fulton says he believes Cake will be elected.

It is the purpose of the business men of LaGrande to make it a "Saturday town." Already pledges circulated among the business men have resulted in arrangements to bring crowds to the city every Saturday. The band will play every Saturday afternoon and evening on the streets and various entertainments are planned for these events.

The third time since its erection, in 1889, the Eiffel tower is being painted. It is as well that the process is not more frequent, seeing that it costs \$15,000. For the first renewal the color was orange, but last time it was changed to gold. Now it is to be silver white from the third platform upward and iron brown lower down. Forty men will be at work for three months and 300 pintals of paint will be used.

Power that cannot be broken and an open door in China are what the American government proposes as its policy in the far east. The world powers are just waking up to the fact that this policy is the reason for the United States' quiet determination to move the Philippine naval base from Olongapo to Manila Bay and make it bristle so with 14 inch guns that all the navies on earth never will be able to get past.

In March Portland set afloat for foreign ports more than twice the quantity of wheat shipped by any other city in the United States, taking a greater lead even than she did in February, when she occupied a position at the head of the column. The shipments from the Willamette River metropolis last month totaled 1,422,367 bushels, as against 899,986 bushels forwarded from the combined ports of Puget Sound, the nearest competitor, according to a bulletin of statistics compiled by the Department of Commerce and Labor.
