A CHANCE FOR HARMONY

James A. Garfield, secretary of the Interior, sailed from San Francisco on Monday for the Hawaiian Islands. On his return he will visit the Umatilla Irrigation project in Oregon, which he states is progressing satisfactorily and will be rushed to completion as soon as possible.

While in Oregon, an effort should be made to get the Secretary to visit the Klamath project and make a thorough investigation of conditions here. This would give the Directors of the Water Users' Association an opportunity to straighten out matters connected with the work here, which have been causing dissatisfaction among some of the members. We believe this misunderstanding is the result of a lack of knowledge on the part of the farmers as to what is being done, and the sooner the matter is straightened out the better it will be for the success of the project.

If the proper authorities could induce Mr. Garfield to come here these problems could be laid before him and some solution arrived at. In order to insure success it is imperitively necessary that the land owners and the Reclamation Service work in harmony. We believe Project Engineer Murphy will unite with the Water Users in persuading the Secretary to come here, as every delay will tend to widen the breach caused by the lack of knowledge on the part of the land owners. Mr. Garfield is the man to bring peace to the people of this section and every pressure should be brought to bear to get him to visit here on this trip.



RESTORATION TO ENTRY OF LANDS IN
 National Forest. Notice is hereby given
 that the lands described below, embracing
 110 acres, within the Cascade National Forest,
 Oregon, will be subject to settlement and
 entry under the provisions of the homestead
 laws of the United States and the act of
 June 11, 1906, (34 Stat., 220), at the United States
 Land Office at Lakeview, Oregon, on August
 8th, 1908. Any settler who actually and in
 good faith claiming any of said lands for agri-
