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Artificial silk is very deficient in strength, especially when wet, but strong threads and fabrics which have the gloss of silk and are not affected by water can be made by subjecting cotton to various treatments. The oldest process, mercerizing or stretching the fibers in a bath of caustic alkali, produces an inferior gloss. In the newer methods, the cotton fibers are practically covered with a coating of artificial silk, either by dipping them into solutions of cellulose similar to those from which artificial silk is made, or by treating them with solvents of cellulose and thus forming the silky coating out of the fibers themselves. The imitations of silk produced by these methods are very strong and durable, for exposure to moisture weakens only the coating and not the body of the fiber.

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
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
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
