### ONE AND ONE-THIRD FARE UNTIL FIRST OF YEAR

On account of the Christmas and New Year holidays the Southern Pacific will sell special round trip tickets on its lines to San Francisco, Los Angeles, Portland, Seattle, Tacoma, and Vancouver, B. ## Good Roads in Other States.

The state of Massachusetts was one of the first to consider seriously the question of building its roads under the authority and care of trained men. The legislature, feeling this need pressing upon the people, outlined a plan by which a commission of three suitable men was appointed to take charge of and build certain lines of road throughout the state, based upon the needs of the community and the physical conditions. This commission has now been in existence for about 15 years, and it has built in that time nearly 5,000 miles of thoroughly well devised stone and gravel roads. It has taken charge of the construction of several hundred miles of town highways which have been built under the direction and supervision, but which still remain town ways.

### REPUBLICAN MEMBERS WILL HOLD CAUCUS.

PORTLAND, Dec. 13.—Middle-of-the-road men, as they might be called, will undoubtedly hold the balance of power in the organization of the house of representatives, January 11. Judging from present appearances, neither C. N. McArthur nor L. E. Bean, nor any other candidate who may come into the field can be elected unless he comes to the terms of these middle-of-the-road men.

These men are several in number, scattered in location, but united in purpose. That purpose is this: To organize the house with Republican votes, to eliminate from the organization all question of the United States citizenship, to cut out all consideration of Statehood No. 1 or anti-Statehood No. 1 lines in the conduct of the legislative business of the session or the selection of committees.

There will be a caucus of the Republican members of the house, held at the statehouse in Salem on the morning of Monday, January 11, at 10 o'clock. The call for this caucus has been issued and is now being circulated. It is an amendment of the call issued some time ago by McArthur and his backers in that it sets the time and place definitely and specifies that at least 10 members of the house must sign up before the call is effective. The McArthur call was indefinite, simply specifying that the signers would go into a caucus on the organization.

This definite call was looked at askance, it being feared that as soon as 10 members had signed up, the caucus would be called and the 10 members bound by the action of a bare majority of that number. This has been eliminated by the new call.
