A STINGING REBUKE

THE city council took advantage of the opportunity last night to rebuke Sam Evans and his campaign of falsification by staying away from the meeting which Evans had advertised as being for the purpose of justifying his stand before the public. Of course there is a chance that Sammy did not send positive orders to the governor to come here.

TURKS MUST BE SUBDUED, IS CRY

CHRISTIAN PEOPLE FALL UNDER THE YOKES OF THE PAST, THE SO-CALLED TURK, AND SHEDDING BLOOD NECESSARY

Louis Canella, Portland attorney, who was born near Sparta, and who lived there until nine years ago, is naturally very keenly interested in the progress of the war in the Balkans, and is following developments closely. In the following article Mr. Canella has outlined the causes leading up to the war, and tells something of the present status of the belligerent nations.

The Christian people who lived, and were so unfortunate as to fall under the yoke of the past, "the so-called Turk," ever since the year 1453, the year of the fall of Constantinople, have in reality but once been shown any protection or mercy by the six great European countries. This was at the time when that immortal statesman, Gladstone, who, year after year, denounced "the unspendable Turk," and tried to arouse the conscience of Europe to avenge and stop the massacres of Christians by the past. But his efforts were without any success. The six European nations that can settle this unspeakable affair once for all have procrastinated and endured for many years, and still are inclined to permit the tortures and slaughtering of the Christian race, only for the sake of the commercial interests and profits they have or hope to at least acquire.

Conditions Are Unchanged
Greece as well as the Balkan states has been given by the attitude of its imaginary protectors from the Turks, the credit to think that its protectors look on as mere spectators, do nothing, and say nothing, but are rather pleased for the happening of such unaccountable tortures and massacres to the Christians, so they can gain by such atrocious acts some concessions by the Turkish government. A few years ago there was formed in Turkey a new government, a new Sultan, a new party, so-called "Young Turks." After admitting the fact that their nation was barbarous, they assured the European countries that civilization would reign in Turkey; that barbarism would pass away with the old sultan, and that Turkey would take her place in the congress of civilization, but old Turk or young Turk, old system or new, Turkey is still Turkey, with the shameful massacres towards the Christians.

Christians Put to Death
Bands of Turkish soldiers invade the mountain regions, where the half-starved Christians live, and every man, woman and child is put to death. The massacres are accompanied by scenes that are worse than murder. They are hunted like wild beasts; the women and even the children are killed because they are Christians, and because the Mohammedan believes it is a worthy and sacred duty to kill an infidel (Christian), an act that will insure him a particularly comfortable divan in the Mohammedan heaven.

The Turks are taught by the interpreters of their prophet that Allah looks with pleasure upon the massacre of any man, woman or child, not a Mohammedan, and that Allah rewards the murderer richly, and in proportion to the number of his murders. The descriptions of the atrocities inflicted upon these miserable Christian people are too frightful for conception and repetition.

Turks Should Be Expelled
The Turks, savage and merciless, lately declared that they keep order within their own dominion; that they attend to their own affairs in their own house, and do not have to give account to any one, and civilization, such as it is, accepts this explanation, and allows the massacres to continue. It is as though, in a civilized city, a man within his four walls was murdering women and children, and offered no other explanation than that he was working within his own house and within his own rights.

The power of Turkey should be driven from Europe. Constantinople should become a civilized city, inhabited by civilized human beings.
Turks, who have degraded the once glorious valley of the Nile, should be driven back to Asia, from whence they came. This condition ought to interest the so-called Christian countries. The duty of the educated civilization men lies beyond national boundaries.
Appeals Are Unseen
The nations that call themselves Christians, and profess regard for the teachings of the Holy Nazarene, should save these wretched and oppressed followers of the same faith.

A slight effort on their part would stop the atrocities.
Appeals and protests about the atrocities and slaughters inflicted upon these miserable fellowmen, the Greeks, Bulgarians, Servians and Montenegrins, have been made for decades, but proved futile and in vain, the only answer they usually received was, "You people behave yourselves well, and everything will be all right."

The time has now arrived for these little nations, Greece, Bulgaria, Servia and Montenegro, to realize that it is useless to wait any longer for protection or mercy, or to expect the Turk to remedy conditions, and they have taken up their own arms, and will try to establish, if they are not interfered with, by their pretended protectors, once for all, freedom, liberty and civilization. They will try to form a government wherein each individual may worship according to the dictates of his own conscience.

A LETTER TO THE PEOPLE

With election day approaching, and little, if anything, said of surveyor for Klamath county, I feel it is a citizen's duty to place before the voters some facts.

While it is generally understood that the office of surveyor is unremunerative, and while the Oregon state law allows no salary for county surveyor for Klamath county, except it provides the surveyor shall receive \$5 per day for services rendered, and while other more populated counties employ a surveyor who gives his entire time to county business for \$1,500 per year, yet the aggregate amount of bills, barring some which might have been overlooked, which have been allowed to E. H. Henry for services and expenses total \$4,853.44 in something less than a year:

I do not know if these bills will stand investigation or not, however, it would be interesting to know tomorrow how the bill for \$550 and also the bill for \$23 were arrived at, making a total of \$583, paid for three prints of a map of Klamath county, the original of which was compiled for a private company. One of these maps is mounted in the assessor's office, while the other two are, to my knowledge, still unmounted.

The official record of the above figures is an excellent showing for the county surveyor, letting alone private business, which I do not care to add at this writing. I know that the work performed for the sum of \$4,853.44 can be done for less, and that under a business-like and economical administration of the affairs of the office of county surveyor, which I stand for, and which I pledge myself if elected, that the county work can be done for much less than \$4,853.44.

Correct and true, I am a candidate, and it is my privilege to know something about the office I expect to fill. On the other hand, to the citizen, the voter or taxpayer, the office of surveyor of Klamath county is worth some passing notice.
