HARRIMAN LODGE WORK SUSPENDED

COLD WEATHER CAUSES A DE-
LAY IN BUILDING OPERATIONS
UNTIL SPRING—CREW RE-
TURNS TO KLAMATH FALLS

A. L. Bragg, superintendent of con-
struction for the Klamath Develop-
ment company at Harriman Lodge,
returned from the upper end of the
Lake yesterday, after working his
crew of carpenters as long as weather
conditions would permit. Work at
the Lodge has been abandoned until
spring.

The four cottages being erected at
the Lodge for summer guests are fin-
ished with the exception of painting
and papering, says Mr. Bragg, and
good progress has been made on the
\$12,000 bungalow being constructed
for Herbert Fleischacker. The pil-
ing for the big boathouse are driven,
and enough work has been done on
the structure to insure its completion
by the time the motorboat fleet is
ready to resume navigation in the
spring.

Mr. Bragg will spend the winter in
this city and in visiting California
points.

NAVAL BATTLE IS IN PROGRESS

GREEKS AND TURKS ARE FIGHT-
ING, ACCORDING TO DISPATCH
FROM CONSTANTINOPLE—TRY
TO REACH AGRAN SEA

LONDON, Dec. 16.—A Greek cruiser
and two torpedo boats are battling
with a Turkish cruiser and a destroy-
er off the island of Tenedos, near the
Dardanelles, according to a dispatch
from Constantinople.
It is presumed that the Greeks are
trying to run the blockade and reach
the Aegean Sea.

FAULDER CASE FORMALLY ENDED

RETURN RECEIVED BY COUNTY
CLERK FROM THE STATE PENI-
TENTIARY—ALL OF THE PA-

County Clerk De Lap this morning
received a return of execution in the
case of Noble Faulder, who was
hanged at Salem Friday for the kill-
ing of Louis Gebhardt. The return
signed by H. K. Larson, superintend-
ent of the penitentiary, has attached
to it the death warrant, issued March
13th by Judge Benson, the reprieve
from May 3 to December 13, signed
by Governor Oswald West, and a
statement signed by twelve witnesses
to the execution that the sentence
was carried out.

WILSON AND HIS PARTY ARE HOME

PRESIDENT-ELECT IS GIVEN AN
OVATION ON THE ARRIVAL OF
THE STEAMER HERMUDAN
FROM HAMILTON

NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—Woodrow
Wilson arrived here at 2:30
this morning on the Bermudan. The boat
docked at 8:15, when Mr. Wilson was
given an ovation.

Miss Margaret Wilson, who re-
mained in New York, was present.
Scores of police officers and secret ser-
vice operators patrolled the dock.
Only persons carrying the proper cre-
dentials were allowed to meet the
steamer.

After their baggage had been ex-
amined the Wilson party went to the
Waldorf-Astoria.

The president-elect will leave this
afternoon for Trenton. He will re-
turn tomorrow to attend the Southern
Society dinner. He refused to dis-
cuss politics.

Mr. Wilson admitted that he would
confer with William Jennings Bryan,
but would not say where. He indicat-
ed that there would be no publication
of his appointments until they were
made.

Two automobiles filled with police-
men preceded the Wilson party to the
hotel. A secret service officer sat with
the chauffeur of the machine in which
Mr. Wilson rode.
