ARRANGEMENTS UNDER WAY FOR INTERVENTION

Wilson insists that he has not been advised by the President as to the plans to be adopted—President-elect will send in his resignation as Governor of New Jersey in a few days

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 12.—If it is decided to intervene in Mexico the 7,000 troops on the border will be replaced by twice as many militiamen.

"The members of the militia of the police are intensely excited," said General Mills, chief of the division of militia affairs, "and all are eager for active service."

Ambassador Wilson reports that the entire population of Mexico City is terrorized. Rumors of attacks and massacres are current.

It is reported that the president of the Red Cross society has been slain. Disturbances detected members of the White Cross conveying ammunition. They were summarily executed.

Wilson believes that the fighting will continue all afternoon.

Last night the White Cross society estimated that aid had been given by them to 1,200. The Red Cross society aided 2,000.

President Taft is receiving hourly reports of the state department.

PHONE SYSTEM FOR HIGH SCHOOL

Grand Jury is Probing the Gambling Situation in City

It is Reported that Witnesses are Asked Concerning Games Conducted Here. Man who Escaped Punishment is Called in and Closely Questioned

An alleged disagreement between Klamath Falls gamblers is being made the subject of a probe by the Klamath county grand jury, and on Wednesday several witnesses were before the jury to give their versions of the matter.

Chief of Police Smith yesterday visited a room in the alley back of the corner of Sixth and Main streets, and in which it was claimed gambling had been carried on. Some time ago

the police made a raid on this place and arrested several men. Three of them were fined, but, it is claimed, two others who were in the game there were allowed to go without punishment. One of these men was before the grand jury yesterday.

The proprietor of a local pool room was among the witnesses summoned by the grand jury. It is believed that he was called in connection with the same matter, but this could not be positively ascertained.

It is believed that the grand jury will make a final report to Judge Benson Saturday afternoon. Rumor has it that several true bills will be returned. It was reported this morning that an important witness in an especially serious case had been placed under guard for fear that an attempt might be made to escape the jurisdiction of the court.

This afternoon members of the police force were summoned before the grand jury.

High School Students Form Junior Chamber of Commerce
