This morning a letter was received from the Grants Pass Commercial Club, stating that petitions were being sent to Washington, and similar organizations throughout Oregon are also active in this behalf.

BILLION FEET IS PLACED ON SALE

TO REACH THIS, A RAILROAD TWO HUNDRED MILES LONG WILL BE CONSTRUCTED IN THE NEAR FUTURE

(Herald Special Service)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 9.—Secretary of Agriculture Houston today approved the disposal of 1,000,000,000 feet of Western yellow pine timber from the Klatab national forest in Northern Arizona. In order to get this timber out it will be necessary to build a railroad approximately 200 miles long. Such a railroad will connect Colorado and Utah with the world famous Grand Canyon of the Colorado, which hitherto has been accessible only from the south.

For several years the construction of such a railroad has been considered by various capitalists, but it has been stated that the lack of assured immediate traffic was an effectual barrier.

It is pointed out, however, that a contract for a billion feet of timber will overcome this difficulty by providing a commodity for transportation which, together with tourist and local traffic, will place the project on a paying basis practically from the outset.

OBJECTS TO THE W. U. ASSESSMENT

ONE WATER USER SUGGESTS COMBINING THE OFFICE OF ATTORNEY AND SECRETARY TO CUT DOWY EXPENSES

Editor Evening Herald:

My attention has just been called to the published notice of the water users levy for the year 1914, and it seems to the writer that the assessment of 15 cents per acre is much too high. The estimated amount of \$4,318 for salaries of officers and employes especially seems high to me.

If we cannot have this part of the work done for \$2,500 we might as well do without the Water Users Association. Twenty-five hundred dollars seems enough to pay for officers and employes, and this would bring the total expense to less than \$3,500. With 35,000 shares available for assessment, the cost could be made 10 cents per acre, and pay a liberal amount for everything needed in connection with the work of the association.

Water users all over the project should give this careful consideration and should at once send a protest to the secretary of the water users.

If the expense cannot be kept down another way, the board of directors should combine the offices of secretary and attorney. At this time it would be easy to get one man to do this work, and at much less expense than is required at present for two. Then, too, with a secretary of the interior who knows our needs and is willing to help us, there is little call for so many trips to Washington by the president of the association.

Woman Is Head of N. Y.'s Prison System



NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—The selection of Miss Katherine B. Davis as the correction commissioner of New York city by Mayor John Purroy Mitchel, who took office at the beginning of the year, throws into the hands of a woman the management of a prison system which is more important than that of many states. Miss Davis—Dr. Davis—will, for instance, have charge of the Tombs, New York's famous city prison. The county penitentiary will also be under her control.

Here will be a chance for reform such as few women have had in the history of the world. The Tombs is one of the worst mismanaged institutions of the kind. Favoritism of all kind flourishes. Perhaps every crime known, some of them the most heinous, is committed within its walls, unchecked by calloused keepers. Opium smuggling is one of the regular industries. Bribery is the commonest crime. No favors may be obtained without paying for them.

JEWISH COLONY MAY BE STARTED

150 FAMILIES BELONG TO ASSOCIATION, AND THEY MAY SEND SOME TO THIS PART OF OREGON TO SETTLE

PORTLAND, Jan. 9.—Benjamin Brown, president and general manager of the Jewish Agricultural and Colonization Association of Gunnison, Utah, is in Portland for the purpose of interesting Jewish people of this community in the possibilities of earning a livelihood on farms.

The organization which he represents was established three years ago, and is now a colony of 150 families. The colony has expended over \$100,000 in Government lands, and now has more than 6,500 acres under cultivation.

With a view of expanding the colony into new territory, Brown is stopping in the principal cities in California, Oregon and Washington, where he delivers lectures. He says he has met with considerable success.

The colony plans to establish a bank through contributions from wealthy families, and loan money to colony farmers.
