First Term Record of Second District Congressman Is Fine

Eastern Oregon Conditions Now Very Much Before Eyes of Congress as Result of "Nick" Sinnott's Persistent Efforts

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 16.—Everyone remembers the schoolbook story from Roman history about Scipio and the famous saying with which he concluded every speech he made: "Carthago delenda est".

But perhaps you don't know that there is now in the American House of Representatives a man who is making another slogan as familiar to his fellow congressmen as "Carthago delenda est" was to the ears of the Senators of Rome.

More than once he has hurled it at all his colleagues in open debate upon the floor of the House, and backed it up with a mass of statistics so startling that the members of that body have been shocked at the wrong done Oregon.

I will wager that ere this you have guessed who it is that has followed in the footsteps of the famous Roman. Yes, it is "Nick" Sinnott, representative from the Second Congressional District of Oregon, whom I here and now dub "The Scipio of the American Congress."

And best of all the prospects are that his persistence will bring good fruitage in some Congress in the near foreground of the future. If Secretary Lane clings to his declared purpose to recommend no more new reclamation projects until those now under construction are finished or on a paying basis it would mean that it will be six or eight years before new irrigation work will be undertaken anywhere by the federal government.

To illustrate the effect of what I have been telling about, I will cite one circumstance. In the discussion of the Sinnott amendment on the floor of the House February 12, 1915, after Sinnott had made his speech Representative Sherley of Kentucky said, "I am sure that whenever the report comes in from the Secretary of the Interior to Congress—if there is a project for Oregon it will be dealt with by the committee with the utmost fairness and liberality."

Another thing which the member from eastern Oregon is entitled to be proud about is the fact that although serving his first term he is the author of two pieces of general public legislation. I refer to the Sinnott bill providing for two absence periods during a year from a homestead, and the Sinnott bill providing for extension of the enlarged homestead law so as to permit entrymen who could have filed on an additional 160 acres before final proof to do so after final proof and the issuance of the patent.

Although both of these pieces of legislation will be of great benefit to the eastern Oregon homesteaders they will also be of benefit to the homesteaders in all the dry land states. Sinnott thus has the distinction of being a national legislator in his first term. In the case of the last bill it seemed that the bill would die in the Senate in the final rush of

jects. Mr. Sinnott presented to Secretary Lane the need of west Umatilla extension, which was granted. He waged war on the Jackrabbit pest and got the Secretary of Agriculture to have an expert prepare special directions for fighting the pest and also to send an expert to different parts of Oregon to teach settlers how to fight the Jackrabbit pest. Helped to secure favorable report before committee on Apple Box bill and when consideration of same was prevented on the floor of House parliamentary trick—he made a stinging speech of protest which caused wide comment among members of the House. He got apples eliminated from provisions of McKeellar Cold Storage bill and secured an order from the Interstate Commerce Commission suspending increase in rates on strawberries filed by the railroads. And better than all as far as doing something for Oregon in the coming Congress goes he leaves for home with the respect and friendly feelings of every one of his colleagues without a single exception.
