Teaching Convicts How to Knit

Knitting at the opera, knitting at the fashionable dance, knitting at the more informal tango tea, has grown so common it isn't noticed any more. But the fact that the convicts up at Sing Sing are knitting for the Poles is really interesting. The idea of having those "doing time up the river" make things for the people between the German and Russian mill stones originated in the mind of Ernest Schelling, the American pianist. The credit for the application of the idea belongs to Warden Thomas Mott Osborne, the philanthropist penologist, who was experimentally "in stir" himself in his home town of Auburn, and who knows how it feels to be in prison. The knitting at Sing Sing is of course entirely voluntary. But two hundred men ply the needles all the time they are not in the shops, the mess hall or sleeping. The knitted bands, mufflers, socks and such are sent down to Mrs. Schelling, both the famous pianist and his wife being leading members of the American Polish relief committee, and by them are shipped to Poland. Schelling knows how hard the Poles are hit for he owns, or did own before the war, a deal of Polish property. In his student days Schelling was the only pupil of Paderewski, and has spent much time in Poland. In America this season, unexpectedly, but for obvious reasons, the virtuoso is devoting all the time he is not composing to raising money for the Poles. So keen has been his sympathy for the ruined people, Schelling has broken his decision not to play in America until his trans-continental tour next season, and agreed to play once in New York, all the proceeds to go to the Polish fund.

Central Potato Depot Suggested by Bulletin

How co-operation might be worked out by the potato growers of a given district so as to eliminate what the compiler terms "the financial disaster in the marketing of their potatoes met by the vast majority of Oregon farmers for the past three years" is explained in the concluding paragraph of a 40-page potato bulletin just issued by the University of Oregon. The bulletin is called "Markets for Potatoes," makes a general survey of the potato situation, and may be had on application to the extension division at Eugene.

The paragraph in question is: "It might be advisable to establish a central depot at a convenient shipping plant readily accessible to the growers of the district in which the association is formed. To this depot all the growers would ship all their potatoes where they could be inspected and sorted. Only those of the very highest quality in every respect would be marketed for seed and for table use, and these carefully packed and sold under a name or brand that would establish their reputation. If this high quality was rigidly maintained and the reputation fully earned and justified (as has been done similarly for apples from certain districts) a premium price above the prevailing market could be demanded and depended upon.

All culls and surplus could then be worked up for industrial purposes, and the volume of supply probably would warrant the erection and operation of the necessary plants for drying, starch manufacturing and alcohol distilling. The peelings from the dryer and the residue from it and from the starch factory, including the water from the latter, could be used in the distillery for the extraction of all the remaining fermentable values.

Pulp mash from the distillery and the slop could be returned to the growers for stock food in proportion to their contribution of potatoes, or their needs, and all that finally remained could be returned to the ground for fertilizer.

"In this way every stage of the operation, every pound of potatoes raised, might be made to yield a profit to the growers. This presupposes and includes mutual efforts for the improvement in quality and quantity of potatoes grown, and for the combating and eradication of disease. It might be advisable to grow different varieties especially adapted for baking, frying, boiling and for high starch content. While this plan would be an experiment in its initial stages, it is possible that it might be the solution of many of the present difficulties, disappointments and defeats."
