

WAR PARTY LOSES ITS FIGHT FOR A MARTIAL GREECE

CONSTANTINE DISSOLVES THE PARLIAMENT

Followers of Former Premier Have Deserted Him in Several Instances

LONDON, Nov. 12.—After several days of real hot debating and working, King Constantine has finally nuzzled the pro-war party in the freest chamber of deputies by the dissolution of parliament.

To offset this, King Constantine deliberately dissolved parliament, a move Venizelos has declared the king had no power to make.

Already twenty-seven members of the Greek parliament have deserted the war party, according to advices via Berlin, giving the government a majority favoring strict neutrality.

ATHENS, Nov. 12.—A general battle between the allies' expeditionary forces and the Bulgarian troops is in course of development, beginning Tuesday with intermittent skirmishing.

Opposing the Bulgars on the southwest are the British. The French hold the center of the line, and the northern wing is comprised of Serbian soldiers.

RESERVATION RED CANNOT BE VOTER

NEUTRAL NATIONS TO MAKE EFFORTS FOR END OF WAR

JORDAN PREDICTS PROGRESS BY CHRISTMAS

Chancellor of Stanford University Announces Gathering of Delegates From Neutral Nations in Switzerland Next Month to Formulate Definite Plans for Bringing the Titanic Struggle to End

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Chancellor David Starr Jordan of Stanford University today predicted there would be definite peace overtures made by Christmas to the warring nations by a group of leading neutral countries.

He announced an informal meeting of peace advocates at Bern, Switzerland, December 14. All neutral nations are to send delegates.

Jordan says the result expected is the creating of a continuous commission of quasi official delegates from the neutrals, who will address mediation proposals to the belligerents.

WINTER LOGGING NEXT AT OLENE

On the third day of the term, the application of Emil Fagerman, a native of Russia, will be considered by the court.

City Is \$65,000 and More to the Good Now

According to the report of City Treasurer Seimens up to October 1st, the city of Klamath Falls has a bank account of \$65,029.87 to its credit in the bank. It is on this amount that the city is receiving interest.

Deposited in different funds of the municipality are a total of \$69,899.91. There are several funds overdrawn, however, to the sum of \$4,774.24, and the amount of these deficits is subtracted from the total of the other sums in the payment of interest.

ARCHIBALD AGAIN INVOLVED IN WAR PLOT; DENIES IT

INFORMING OFFICIAL ACCUSED OF TREASON

Statement Issued by Austrian Embassy Accuses Former Consul at San Francisco of Spreading Disloyalty Among Countrymen, and of Selling Secrets of Treaties to Allies. Archibald's Case Up to U.S.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The department of justice today announced an immediate investigation of the charge of Dr. Josef Goricar, former Austrian consul at San Francisco, that James Archibald, the American newspaperman recently involved in the scandal leading to the recall of Ambassador Dumba by Austria, knew the contents of the papers he attempted to carry to Austria.

Archibald denies this, and says the statement is a "deliberate lie" from start to finish.

According to a statement from the Austrian embassy today, Dr. Bortner is accused of plotting with Russian and Serbian agents with the intent of disseminating disloyalty among Austro-Hungarian emigrants.

The statement says he was on a leave of absence when war broke out. He was then temporarily attached to the Hungarian consulate at Berlin.

Subsequently it was discovered that he plotted with enemies of the Austro-Hungarian empire, and later fled to Russia. From there he wired his resignation. Since then, the statement says, he has been in America, fomenting trouble in Slavic centers.
