

FORD SAYS HIS PEACE PROPOSAL WELL RECEIVED

"OUT OF TRENCHES BY CHRISTMAS," HIS SLOGAN

"Itney Daddy" says He Has Statements From High Officials of Even Warring Nations, Proving That Some Movement to Bring an End to Hobocnat Is Desired—Pope Benedict's Plans Are Also Brighter.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 26.—Henry Ford today announced that he has signed statements from high officials of both the allied and Teuton governments, declaring the nations are ready for peace proposals.

"People who say my plans are foolish have the greatest surprise of their lives coming," said Ford. "Out of the trenches before Christmas" is to be our slogan. I can say seriously, too, that it is no empty boast.

If no neutral nations are ready to act for a peace conference, Mme. Schwimmerill, prominent in The Hague conferences, will tell President Wilson today, it is reported, that she will present material evidence that the belligerent nations are tired of war, and only awaiting an invitation from neutral nations to discuss peace plans.

Henry Ford goes to Baltimore tomorrow to confer with Cardinal Gibbons regarding the peace conference. It is understood he asks his approval of the plan, so the Catholics of the neutral nations will participate.

Two Americans, Theodore Roosevelt and Elihu Root, had been honored for services to peace.

TELLS THE TALE OF STEFANSSON

MARINER RETURNED FROM THE FROZEN NORTHLAND TELLS OF THE PLUCK AND DARING OF YOUNG EXPLORER

SEATTLE, Nov. 26.—The story of one of the most remarkable trips ever made in the Arctic, that by Viljalmur Stefansson, was brought here this week by Captain Louis Lane, veteran North Sea skipper and friend of the explorer, who arrived from Nome and Cordova.

It was Captain Lane, who, on the flimsiest of chance, hunted Stefansson long given up as lost, and found him recently off the northern coast of Banks Land. Under the midnight sun the two old friends embraced, deliverance coming at a time when the explorers' supplies had dwindled to a minimum.

"Stefansson has just completed the longest and most daring sled trip ever made in the Arctic," said Captain Lane. "For six months he and his three companions, Storckson, Anderson and Thompson, had traversed the north of Banks Land, and the new continent he discovered, relying entirely upon their rifles for food."

"The remarkable thing is that not once did they miss a meal, so keen was their hunting instinct and so true their marksmanship. The little party lived entirely on seal, although they had hoped to get polar bear."

Stefansson and his party, said Captain Lane, are writing the most romantic chapter of Arctic history, and will return to civilization within the next two years with a valuable fund of scientific knowledge. The exploration

EX-ESPEE HEAD DETECTIVE GETS IN BOMB PLOTS

IS CHARGED WITH AIDING LIEUTENANT FAY

Investigator for San Francisco District Attorney's Office Is Arrested in Bay Metropolitan, Charged With Being the Man Who Traveled the Country, Arranging for the Placing of Teuton Bombs, Etc.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 26.—Federal agents today arrested C. C. Crowley, an investigator for the district attorney's office, and former head of the Southern Pacific's detective force, in the anti-American plot investigation. It is charged that he is implicated in the anti-ally bomb plots, which were headed by Lieutenant Fay, now imprisoned in New York.

The specific charge is that Crowley traveled over the country in the interests of the Teutonic allies, arranging for the placing of bombs on ships laden with munitions, and for the destruction of munitions factories filling orders for the allies.

Crowley is also charged with fomenting strife in the different munition plants, seeking to bring about strikes and delays in the turning out of orders. Startling disclosures of his activities here are expected, and authorities are said to have information of plans for wrecking ships clearing here with munitions for the enemies of the Teutons.

After leaving the Southern Pacific Crowley ran a hotel at Goldfield during the mining boom there.

ALLIES PLANNING OFFENSIVE FIGHT ACROSS BULGARIA

WILL LAND FORCES AT SALONIKA SOON

Movement Planned Will Swing Eastward From Uskub, With Sofia as Its Objective—Plan Would Also Seek to Further Hamper Teutonic Advances Toward Turkey—French Finance Minister Urges Loans

PARIS, Nov. 26.—Now that the allies are assured passage through Greek territory, en route to the Balkan front, further landings of allied troops at Salonika are reported as the sequel. It is understood that the allies plan a more forcible fight in the Balkans. They do not want to make an extensive sweep into Serbia, but expect to swing eastward from Uskub to Sofia.

Minister of Finance Ribot today urged the chamber of deputies to pass a credit of a billion, six hundred and thirty-four million dollars for the campaign during the first quarter of 1916. He stated that he regards the future confidently, but pointed out the necessity of preparedness.

BERLIN, Nov. 26.—It is officially announced that the Germans have repulsed the rear guards of the Serb army west of the Sientza River.

(Editor's Note—Sientza is west of Blackbird Plain, and this indicates the invaders are pursuing the Serbs toward Montenegro. Apparently the Teutons have driven the Serbs across the river after the Austrians took Mitrovitz and the Bulgarians Pristina.)

LONDON, Nov. 26.—Rome's official statement today says a fresh line of Austrian trenches on Mt. Calvario, overlooking Goritz, has been captured. The statement made no mention of the fall of Goritz, reported this morning, but generally discredited.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 26.—It is learned semi-officially that the German cruiser, with 375 men, was sunk in the Baltic by the Russians simultaneously with the destruction of the Undine by a British submarine.

Drunken Villistas Fire Across Border; Scrap on

NOGALES, Ariz., Nov. 26.—A hot skirmish was carried on across the border today between Villa troops and United States infantrymen. The Mexican faction was routed.

The attacking troops were Mexicans who were intoxicated. They fired across the border at United States troops, and the Americans returned the volley. Many Mexicans are reported killed, though there are no figures available. The streets of the town over the border were cleared of the riotous. Villa's garrison at Nogales, Sonora, has been evacuated. He left parties to loot the town, and to burn American forces.

General Obregon's army was within miles from Nogales this morning, is expected to occupy the town. Villa's troops are near Hermosillo. They are reported that town tomorrow.
