"GET THE HABIT"

E. W. Gowen, present justice of the peace, Linkville district, candidate for sheriff in the republican primaries.

His statement: When I was sheriff a few years ago, I stated I would make a complete and effective enforcement of the law, with no interest to serve but that of the public, and after I was elected and qualified, did rigidly endeavor to fulfill that promise, and my record as sheriff of Klamath county is an open book and bears me out.

And if nominated and elected in my former position will be my guide in office.

My personal attitude is one averse to anything which might be termed a spectacular nature. I do not desire to arrest any individual without due cause, or for the sake of such notoriety to the office as might arise. On the other hand, necessity arising, absolutely no favoritism may be expected. I am for a strict enforcement of the law, but I am opposed to any absurd technicality which would permit harassment of any individual lacking influence and means of defense possessed by others. Prosecution for the sake of merely making a record for conviction has, to my mind, been one of the greatest fallacies in connection with the police power. I desire to guard against injustice as well as to serve justice, and to that end I shall continue to observe the strict spirit of the law, regardless of those whom it may affect. My platform is as follows:

If I am nominated and elected I will, during my term of office, construe my oath of office to mean a complete and efficient enforcement of the law.

I will have no interest to serve but the public interest.

I will give the protection of my office to all persons, and all classes alike.

I will personally conduct my office with strict regard to economy.

I will at all times serve all official papers with promptness.

I will give all prisoners in my custody humane treatment, wholesome food and clean quarters.

Beginning with Sheriff C. C. Low, it can be said that he stands high in the community. His record during the four years he has been sheriff is an open book.

Carey Ramsby is a young man of sterling worth, who grew to manhood here, and is liked by his legion of acquaintances who call him friend. He is closely related by marriage to the Martin Brothers—Ed, Charley and John—of pioneer milling and merchandising fame, and is well fitted to fill the office he seeks. Both he and his wife stand high socially in Klamath.

Equally high in the esteem of everybody is E. R. Brewbaker and his estimable wife. Although they have not lived in Klamath all their lives, Mr. Brewbaker has been here long enough for people to know and have confidence in him. Before coming here he held various positions of trust, being connected with railroad business, as well as having been on the police force for municipalities.
