

Militia Measure is Passed by House

PROVISION IS MADE FOR SUPPORT OF THE GUARDSMEN'S KIN

 WASHINGTON, June 23.—The House of Representatives today adopted the May resolution empowering the president to use the state militia in Mexico. The two socialist members of congress voted no.

The May resolution providing \$50 a month for the families of militiamen passed unanimously.

The latter bill carried a \$1,000,000 appropriation. It includes maintenance of families dependent upon militiamen's salaries.

Secretary of War Baker today ordered every department commander to send the militia forces to the border as soon as they are equipped.

It is officially learned that America has asked Great Britain to take charge of the American consulates in Mexico in the event of hostilities.

American consuls are still stationed at the seacoast towns. Many of the interior consuls have departed.

MEXICANS CROSS LINE, IS REPORT

BANDITS, ACCORDING TO PRIVATE ADVICES, CROSSED BORDER AND ARE BELIEVED TO HAVE PLANTED DYNAMITE

The marriage of Astor and Miss Force in 1911 excited nationwide comment, as the groom was past fifty, while the bride was then only seventeen years old.

By marrying, Mrs. Dick loses all of the Astor fortune, as a provision in the will of the multi-millionaire provided for a division between his then unborn son by his second wife and Vincent Astor, his son by his first marriage, in case of a second marriage.

MEETING TO BE HELD TOMORROW NIGHT

Following inquiry sent to Adjutant General White, the Telegraph Local Men Asking if it Will Be Possible to Raise a Company of 150 Men Here for Infantry or Coast Artillery Service

Are you interested in the formation of a militia company here? If so, be at the court house tomorrow night. Definite steps toward ascertaining the sentiment of the men of Klamath Falls will be taken then.

The Oregon National Guard commander, Adjutant General White, wishes a company formed here. To that end, he sent telegrams to Captains O. C. Applegate and Frank E. Ankeny, who have been corresponding with him for several months regarding an organization.

In these telegrams, White asks if it will be possible to organize a company here of 150 men, for either infantry or artillery duty. He asks definite information as soon as possible regarding officers, men, etc.

In order to settle the matter one way or another, the idea of holding a meeting was decided upon. The meeting will therefore be held in the court room in the court house tomorrow night and all men are asked to attend.

The Portland men are highly elated at their success, and they promise to spread the fame of Klamath's matchless fishing throughout the Northern part of the state.


MUST CUT WEEDS OR BE ARRESTED

COMPANY PROPOSED FOR KLAMATH FALLS MAY BE A PART OF THE INFANTRY REGIMENT BEING CONSIDERED

The prospect of Klamath Falls' prospective militia company being a member of the Coast Artillery corps does not appeal to old infantrymen. However, there is a prospect of the company being part of the new Fourth Oregon infantry, according to the following from the Portland Journal:

"Prominent National Guard officers expect that the Fourth regiment, Oregon National Guards, will be organized as soon as the Third is filled. Without any apprehensions regarding Mexico, the new law provides for a sufficient number of increases in the National Guard to make the formation of another regiment quite possible.

"Judge C. U. Gantenbain is likely to organize it, and it is said some men are holding off enlisting with expectation of serving under him."

DETAILS STILL LACKING AS TO NEWEST FIGHT

TWO TROOPS ANNIHILATED, SAY MINERS

Unconfirmed Reports Received by Mining Companies Are to the Effect that Mexicans, After Routing the Americans, Drove the Survivors into the Hills—Fighting Report Says Men Were Surrounded

 WASHINGTON, D. C., June 23.—The war department today made public General Pershing's first report on the Carrizal fight. This declares the Mexicans asked a conference, and then attempted to surround the Americans, opening fire when they failed to do so.

 EL PASO, June 23.—Mining companies here have received unconfirmed reports that Troops C and E of the Tenth cavalry were annihilated in the Carrizal battle.

Private advices declare Mexican horsemen killed fleeing dismounted Americans. The survivors are reported as wandering in the foothills without food or water.

The official Mexican version of the battle contradicts this.

A foodstuff embargo is effective all along the border.
