## LaFollette Will Defend Employees if They Strike

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—It is announced today that counting of the strike vote by the railway brotherhoods will be completed by next Monday. If the move carries it authorizes the officials of the brotherhoods to call a strike if one is deemed necessary. The railroad companies today launched a nation wide advertising campaign, charging that they offered to arbitrate the trouble or refer it to the Interstate Commerce Commission, but that the employees refused.

informed that the railroad men's board had agreed to resume conferences in New York August 5th.

Anticipating a strike, resolutions demanding compulsory arbitration are ready for presentation to congress. Senator LaFollette will defend the employees. He had prepared a speech charging the railroads with watering their stock.

The threatened strike is sure to cause a hot congressional fight. It also will cause much suffering because of inability to move foodstuffs, especially in the East.

It is reported that the sentiment of the brotherhoods is overwhelmingly in favor of a strike.

## Courtly Old Gentlemen Visit Klamath 18 Years

## WILL PAY WELL TO GET GUISTO

IT IS SAID THAT IT WILL TAKE \$8,000 OR MORE WITH TWO PLAYERS THROWN IN FOR BOOT TO MAKE THE TRADE

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2.—Any club that acquires Louis Guisto will pay more than \$8,000, besides throwing in two players for good measure. Of course, Manager Walter McCredie of Portland has not made any statement to that effect, but during his last visit in San Francisco, he confided to several friends that Charley Comiskey, White Sox owner, had made the above offer for Guisto.

"Comiskey's offer, while apparently lucrative enough for any class AA player, will not induce me to part with Guisto," said McCredie at the time. "I consider Guisto the equal of any player Comiskey owns. Guisto will be playing ball when Eddie Collins is occupying a seat in the grandstand. Guisto is probably the most sought player that has played minor league ball since the days of Oscar Vitt, now with Detroit, played as a Seal.

Guisto played with Yreka last summer. He got four hits off Lyle Bigbee in seven times at bat in both the games. He struck out three times, walked twice and was hit once.
