NIGHT SCHOOL TO BEGIN SOON

WORK IN COMMERCIAL SUBJECTS WILL BE OFFERED AT HIGH SCHOOL FOR TEN WEEKS AFTER OCTOBER SECOND

Night school will open at the Klamath county high school on Monday evening, October 2d, at 7:30 o'clock, and will continue in session on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings for at least the following ten weeks. Mr. Hogg will be in charge.

This school is free to every one in the community who wishes to avail himself of the opportunity to do work in the commercial branches. Preference will, however, be given to those students who are not now enrolled in the regular day sessions.

The following is the tentative list of subjects from which the program will be made up: Bookkeeping, penmanship, business English, shorthand, typewriting, commercial arithmetic, rapid calculation. All who expect to attend should enroll at the high school building some time during the week beginning September 25th. Two subjects are all that should be attempted. Students are asked to express a second choice of subjects, as only those subjects will be offered which are in the greatest demand.

There are now fifteen typewriters installed in the commercial department, so that there are ample facilities for all who care to enroll in this subject. Such subjects as typewriting and shorthand depend for their success upon close application and constant practice. Ten weeks is not long enough to make one proficient in either one of them, but it is ample time to lay the foundation for success in them if the student will continue his studies and practice according to Principal C. R. Bowman.

It is important that all who expect to enroll should register during the coming week, so that a program can be arranged that will suit the greatest number.

PENSION BILL IS WITH COMMITTEE

MEASURE TO PENSION INDIAN WAR VETERANS EXPECTED TO BE MADE LAW SOON AFTER SHORT WINTER SESSION

The Indian war pension bill, which if passed will affect many citizens of Klamath county, was still in the hands of the senate and house conference committee when congress adjourned recently, according to Captain O. C. Applegate.

Congressman Keating of Colorado, author of the bill, says it will again be brought to the attention of congress as soon as possible after the re-assembling of congress in December. As the measure has passed both houses, and was placed in the hands of the conference committee only because several amendments had been made in the senate, the friends of the measure are quite confident of its final passage soon after the beginning of the short session next winter.
