WHY "AMERICANISM"?

NEVER, until the administration of President Wilson made it necessary, was it thought desirable to make "Americanism" the rallying cry of an electoral campaign; for, until now, there was never a need for it.

The occasion has arisen from the disposition to substitute political expediency for that protection of the national honor and of the rights of citizenship which has in the past been regarded as the first duty of our government. Our president has boasted of his "reckless enthusiasm for humanity"; but our citizens, in a period of nominal peace, have perished by the hundred without a serious attempt to save them from violence, robbery and death. It is for that reason that we are now speaking of "Americanism," and it is for that reason that we need to consider anew what it really means.

"Americanism" is not a new ideal, it is our inherited tradition. What is it that distinctively marks the American spirit?

Our fathers felt that there was in human personality something sacred, something which mere physical force ought to respect, and that governments should be made to respect it. The fundamental need of a human being is liberty protected by law. How, after it was won by the overthrow of absolutism and the establishment of independence, could it be defended from the arrogance and aggression of mere power?

The answer our fathers gave to that question was a constitutional union for the "common defense"—a mutual pledge that the right of the individual citizen to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness should be regarded as a sacred right, for the defense of which the whole force of the nation must, if necessary, be exercised.

This spirit has not animated the present administration at Washington. Its main purpose has been to keep itself in power. To that end it is ready to place a class interest, a sectional interest, or the fear of a foreign power before its duty to stand for the equal rights of all, regardless of mere numbers and voting power, and for the rights of American citizens wherever they may be.

It is a fact of record that, between his inauguration and the present time the president of the United States, during a period when American citizens were being robbed, outraged and murdered in Mexico, and shot through and drowned on the high seas, has made a score of public addresses in which he spoke of our duties toward Mexico and other countries, of peace, of the flag, of the army and navy, and of our place and influence among the nations; but NEVER ONCE, in a single statement to the public or to Congress, so far as I have been able to find, has he in these addresses affirmed the duty of the government of the United States to protect the lives or the property of citizens of this country. It is this absence of a sense of responsibility that has brought the word "Americanism" into this campaign. The people have come to feel that, while the administration boasts of devotion to the abstract idea of humanity, there is no effective protection of the American citizen as such. On the contrary, they have seen the guarantees for the security of their business, their property, and their lives, upon which they had formerly relied, gradually disappear through disregard.—David Jayne Hill.

ASKS INDICTMENT AGAINST SUPERIOR

United Press Service ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Sept. 26.—Special Prosecutor Lockwood today asked for an indictment against District Attorney McDaniels, charged with murdering his wife after a quarrel. The murder occurred last July. McDaniels says he was called from his home by a fake telephone call and that his wife was beaten to death during his absence. He declares the murderer fired at him as he was entering the house on his return.

ZEPPELINS LOSE TO AUTOMOBILES

AUTOS IN THIS COUNTRY KILL MORE THAN KAISER'S ZEPPELINS—38 ARE VICTIMS IN SAN FRANCISCO ALONE

United Press Service NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—More people have been killed in automobile accidents in the United States already in 1916 than have been killed in all Zeppelin raids in England, according to compilations completed here today. In San Francisco alone, 38 have been killed by automobiles this year. Several states are planning more drastic laws to prevent such a record next year.

Wheat Crop Less WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 26.—The United States department of agriculture announced this morning that the total wheat crop of the United States, Canada and eight other countries for 1916 will be 31 per cent less than the 1915 crop.

Bread May Go Up CHICAGO, Sept. 26.—Following advertisements by the Chicago bakers that nickel loaves of bread would sell for six cents after next Wednesday, federal officials announced today that the government will demand justification for the raise, or start prosecution under the Sherman anti-trust act.
