56 SCHOOLS TO DEBATE FOR CUP

KLAMATH FALLS IS ONLY CANDIDATE IN SOUTH CENTRAL OREGON—EIGHT DISTRICTS IN THE STATE

(Herald Special Service)

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Sept. 27.—The high schools of Oregon are drifting back to the stirring old debating days of two generations ago, if the enrollment in the Oregon high school debating league for the season of 1916-17 is evidence.

So far fifty-six high schools have entered, and a number of registrations has not yet come. The entire registration last year was fifty-one, for the year preceding forty-one, and for the year before that thirty-three.

R. L. Kirk, superintendent of schools of Springfield, is president of the league, and Earl Kilpatrick, assistant dean of the University of Oregon extension division, is secretary-treasurer. The schools compete for a University of Oregon cup, which is awarded to the winner in the finals that are held at the University's expense in Eugene each year during May. The fifty-six high schools that have enrolled are, by districts:

Lower Columbia—Corbett, Astoria, Upper Columbia—The Dalles, Prineville, Moro, Madras, Wasco, North Willamette, Tillamook, Stayton, Molalla, Canby, Salem, Amity, Forrest Grove, Oregon City, Estacada, McMinnville, Silverton, Milwaukie, Woodburn, Gaston, Hubbard, Jefferson, Clatskanie.

South Willamette—Eugene, Philomath, Springfield, Corvallis, Albany, Junction City, Lebanon, Drain, Glendale, Sutherlin, Harrisburg, Coos Bay—Myrtle Point, North Bend, Coquille, Bandon, Marshfield.

Southern Oregon—Ashland, Medford, Grants Pass, Umatilla—Milton-Freewater, Hermiston, Pendleton, Athena, Stanfield (Reeves H. S.), Condon.

Eastern Oregon—Union, LaGrande, Enterprise, Elgin, Southeastern Oregon—Vale, Nyssa, Ontario.

South Central Oregon—Klamath Falls. For years there have been only eight districts; now there are ten.

HORSE BUSINESS STILL IS GOOD

DESPITE GROWING USE OF MOTOR TRUCKS AND AUTOS, THE HORSE MARKET IS KEPT UP BY EUROPEAN WAR DEMAND.

CHICAGO, Sept. 27.—The European war has caused such a scarcity of horses in the United States that farmers who raise the adaptable Belgian, whose weight ranges from 1,200 to 1,500 pounds, makes it an excellent cavalry or police mount, are putting a high price on the animals which at the present time are being accepted by the horse dealer.

While thousands of Percherons and Belgians weighing from 1,500 to 1,800 pounds are at present employed in drawing cannon and ammunition wagons on the battlefields, they are not so commonly used here as the lighter animal.

A cross between Percheron stock and the American horses makes an almost ideal general purpose animal, and a well matched team will bring from \$500 to \$600, where formerly a team could be purchased at \$200 to \$300. There is no importation of horses at this time, and therefore American farmers are short of the adaptable Belgians, which in part accounts for the increased value.
