Clothes for School Girls



This durable but dainty cape for school girls may be had in heavy woolen plaid for cold weather or lighter material for early fall. The middie is of bloomed variety with detachable skirt. The one-piece undersuit is typical of the newest underwear for girls.

PARIS.—The Spanish comb has had many placings and replacings since its recent appearance as an adjunct to the coiffure. At first it was thrust into the side of the highly styled hair. Then it was thrust straight up in back. But always it found use as an ornament for a high coiffure, whereas now it is thrust jauntily into a coiffure whose salient feature is a fall of hair low on the back of the neck. In this position the Spanish comb is thrust rakishly to one side, but outward rather than upward.

PARIS.—Always there is some one thing without which, in any given season, a woman cannot conscientiously call herself smart. At the instant the thing is a crepe de chine hat, preferably at some amber shade, slightly darker. Both hat and gown must be painted in black, in a wavy, watery pattern which may have tiny buds or large spots or half moons interspersed.

LONDON.—Even though it must be removed when the garment is washed, narrow silver lace is being used on the finest underwear. Lemon crepe de chine is used to one set of underthings de luxe. The knickers are edged with silver lace, a tiny insert of which runs from knee to waist. The camisole is made of lemon crepe de chine brocaded with silver and a short, narrow under skirt is of the same lovely material.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J.—It is possible to have your corsets, underwear, hat and parasol cut from the same piece of gingham as that from which your bathing suit came. The parasol is the latest accessory to join the gingham regime on the beach. One young girl not only wore a brown and white striped gingham gown, a brown gingham hat trimmed with a bow of the brown and white striped goods and a parasol to match, but she even added a wrist bag of the same material.



friend, he faced the latter's accuser on the streets of this city, and the matter was adjusted at a stormy session on the street, in which denials were subjected made.

Hale Affair Discussed

Reter told the grand jury that he had "heard the Hale matter" talked of after the regular sessions of the lodge, and gave the names of those he had heard in these conversations, deploring to one acquaintance the folly of such action.

The testimony of both Edmiston and Reter, it is said, both confirms the letters found in the Los Angeles raid on the office of the Grand Goblin, when valuable documentary evidence was obtained.

Tells of Hale Trial

Department of justice agents are expected today to tell of the "jury trial" given Hale, and tell who was the judge and who were the jury, who were the witnesses, and who was the outer guard. The "trial" is alleged to have been given in the office of a local professional man. The "trial" took place three weeks before the "necktie party."

More Witnesses

Witnesses subpoenaed to appear before the grand jury today, include among others, J. P. Hittson, former Medford chief of police, Dr. M. M. Dow, Joe McMahon, state traffic officer, Jack Hempstreet, former Medford policeman, Dwight Vimont, until recently a postoffice employe, M. B. Bynnell, party in a suit for \$150, filed against Hale, John J. Hoogstraal, local Klegale, who was out of the city Tuesday, when a subpoena was issued, and P. E. Wynkoop, a local citizen.

The Tuesday afternoon witnesses at the hearings were H. E. Griffiths, local Klegale, W. J. Warner, postmaster and Tom Word, head of the department of justice in the north-west.

Bring Burr Here

Arthur Burr, colored bootlegger, who after serving 30 days in the county jail on conviction for bootlegging operations, was decoupled into an auto, and driven to the summit of the Siskiyou, where he was subjected to handling and told "to run," has been located by the federal authorities at Modesto, Calif., and will be brought back to this city to testify. Burr's whereabouts have been indefinite, and he has been trailed through several central California

towns. Burr was the first victim of the nightriding operations.

The third case is that of Henry Johnson of Jackson. Evidence will be introduced in this case to show where he charged against him started and who spread them, to his alleged fellow knights resulting in an "uplift movement" with a rope. Johnson appeared before the last county grand jury. Johnson says he can identify his persecutors, and is open in his charges.
