LATEST DISPATCHES.

The Crown Prince Going Home to Die. A NOVEL LYNCHING. A Mob Compels a Murderer to Commit Suicide.

BELLEVILLE, Texas, March 2.—Tim Forsythe, son of Sheriff Forsythe, of Panola county, who was arrested Tuesday as the murderer of County Treasurer Hill on the 10th of February last, was hanged by the citizens of this city last night. The mob, which consisted of about forty well known citizens, took him from jail and quietly walked him up a ladder prepared as a gallows and after the rope was placed about his neck he was told to jump off, which he did, breaking his neck. The affair was done very quietly and the citizens all approved of the work.

Died from Injuries. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 2.—Thomas Gibbs, the aged gentleman who was assaulted and stabbed in the back by three Chinese highbinders yesterday morning died this morning. He was 55 years of age and owned a restaurant. No definite clue has yet been found to his murderers, although several Chinese highbinders are under arrest on suspicion.

Killed in a Mine. SHINGLER SPRINGS, CAL. March 2.—News has been received here that Will Gaylord, while working in his mines near Weaver creek on Tuesday was imprisoned by the shaft caving in and when taken out a few hours after was unconscious. He died a few hours later from asphyxia and injuries.

Alaskan Fishers' Meeting. SAN FRANCISCO.—At a meeting of Alaskan fishers held last night resolutions were adopted fixing the following rates for the coming season: Wages \$50 per month, and ten cents additional for each king salmon and half cent for each small salmon caught.

Will Take Him Home to Die. SAN REMO, March 2.—Arrangements have been made to take the Crown Prince to Berlin, probably this week, to avoid his death on foreign soil.

Delegating Power. BERLIN, March 2.—The Emperor has signed a decree by which Prince William is authorized to act for him and to sign his name in case of physical incapacity.

Weather Indications. SAN FRANCISCO, March 2.—Weather indications for the next 24 hours for the Pacific Coast: Local rains with temperature colder.

Answers Tascott's Description. TAYLORVILLE, Ill., March 1.—A well dressed young man, answering the description of Tascott, the murderer of millionaire Snell at Chicago, was arrested here to-night by the City Marshal. He gave his name as John Henry, and claims to reside at Champaign Illinois.

Killed by a Fall. SAN FRANCISCO, March 1.—Joseph Garcia de Cadis, aged 84 years, formerly professor of mathematics, while sitting on a window sill in his room in this city this afternoon, lost his balance and fell. His brains were dashed out on the sidewalk below.

Another Unfortunate. VIRGINIA CITY, March 1.—S. Frazier, a recent arrival from Bloomfield, Nevada county, California, has been taken down with small-pox.

TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

Spokane Falls, W. T., has passed an anti Chinese ordinance. The supreme court denied the petition of Sharon heirs for a rehearing in the case recently decided in a lower court that Sarah Althea Hill, now Mrs. Judge Terry, was legally married to the late Senator Sharon.

Great revival among Methodists in New York results in over 500 conversions. J. N. Dolph chosen member of congress republican committee.

Congressman Hermann presented a memorial of the board of trade of Portland asking an increase in United States judges salaries to \$5000. A riot of unemployed workmen in Rome.

The Russian frontier guard increased by 2600 men. Four regiments of infantry, under Gen. Archinikoff, arrived at Kisheneff. The lower house of the Hungarian diet approved the convention delimiting frontier between Hungary and Roumania.

Mexican minister's home advises deny that Mexican troops have been sent to Guatemala. Tried to Kill His Sister's Alleged Persecutor.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 2.—Dr. James McShafter, son of Judge James McShafter, married Miss A. Lange, in Germany seven years since, against the desires of his father. The Judge's family then opposed the union of the son's wife into their family and social circle without avail.

In the latter part of last year Dr. McShafter, presumably under paternal pressure, commenced a suit of divorce upon the grounds that his wife was not true to her marital vows. Carl Lange, a sailor brother of the persecuted woman, came to this city to champion his sister's cause.

Divining that the elder McShafter was at the bottom of the divorce proceedings, he sought to stop them by threatening the magistrate's life. Not being successful in his threats, he to-day attempted McShafter's life by firing two shots at him in the crowded new city hall. Neither shot took effect, and Lang now finds himself in the tanks, charged with assault on murder.

A DESPERATE BATTLE. A School Row Results in Two Deaths and Several Wounds. ABERDEEN, Miss., March 2.—A tragedy occurred at Rome, this State, yesterday. Arthur Deverport, a teacher of the public schools at Rome, expelled one or two pupils recently. Friends of the teacher on one hand, and those of the expelled pupils on the other, met at the school house. A row ensued, and James Bailey, Jr., fired six charges from his pistol, instantly killing R. A. Rutledge, and fatally wounding his son Edward. Benjamin Fish and Bailey's son received slight wounds. Bailey was shot inside and received a cut in the back.

Held to Answer. SAN FRANCISCO, March 1.—The preliminary examination of David Mahoney, charged with the murder of John H. Lanson, of this city, was held before the superior court to-day. The defense presenting no evidence, Mahoney was held to answer before the superior court.

MORNING TELEGRAMS.

Tariff Tinkers Propose to take the Tariff off of Wool. TARIFF TINKERING. A Movement to Take Duty Off of Wool.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 1.—The tariff bill submitted by the ways and means committee of the house proposes to fix the duty on pig iron at \$6 per ton. The duty on this is now \$6.72 per ton. It proposes to fix the duty on iron ore and steel railway bars weighing more than twenty five pounds to the yard and slabs of billets of steel, at \$11 per ton.

On iron ore and steel rails weighing not more than twenty-five pounds to the yard, \$14 per ton. On iron ore and steel flat rails punched, \$15 per ton.

WOOL DUTY FREE. The bill provides for the admitting, duty free, after July 1st, of all wools, hair of goats and other like animals, wools on the skin, woolen rags, hoddy mingo, waste and flock.

MANUFACTURED WOOLENS. After October 1st, 1888, it provides, among other things, for a 40-percent duty on woolen and worsted cloth, shawls, and all manufactures of wool not specifically enumerated, and on flannels, blankets, knit goods, and women's and children's dress goods composed in part of wool. This is a reduction on manufactured articles. The duty now on all manufactured woolen not otherwise specified is 68.52 per cent (ad valorem), and on women's and children's clothing composed in whole or in part of wool, 72.00 per cent; on blankets the present duty is 71.95.

WM. R. MORRISON. Will Run if Nominated for the Vice-Presidency. CHICAGO, March 1.—Wm. R. Morrison, writes to a well known democratic politician of this city, in answer to a direct question put to the former as to whether he wanted the Vice-Presidency. He answered that he considered that the wishes of Indiana should be first regarded in the matter.

If that state presents an acceptable candidate in an earnest way, its wishes should not be disregarded. If the position goes to some man out side of that state, Mr. Morrison says that he may be considered in the race in the fullest sense of the term. It is an open secret that Mr. Morrison is tired of his present place, and he is not at all ambitious to go back to congress. His friends are confident that Cleveland will be well satisfied with him as a running mate.

Big Fire in a California Town. JACKSON, CAL., March 1.—The principal business portion of the town of Sutton Creek was destroyed by fire this afternoon. It started in Corbett's hotel, on the east side of Main street, and burned all the business places on that side of the street, crossing to the west side at Werner's butcher shop and swept the entire block. Over twenty business houses were destroyed with nearly all the contents. The post-office and store are a total loss, will reach over \$100,000. The fire is still burning, but is under control.

Hung After Five Reprieves. HUDSON, N. Y., March 1.—Oscar J. Beckwith was hanged at the court house at nine minutes past 10 o'clock this morning, for the murder of Simon Vandercook at Austerlitz on the 11th of January, 1882. The date of his execution had been fixed five times before; but had been postponed by legal proceedings and executive clemency.

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
